THE UNIVERSITY COMMEMORATION.—

The University commemoration yesterday was mainly notable by reason of its being marked by the conferring of a degree upon the first lady medical student who has graduated at the Adelaide University. To Miss Laura M. Fowler belongs the honour of having won this proud distinction. Others of her sex will no doubt soon follow in the path in which she has so well shown the way. Our own impression is that a wide field of usefulness is open for women who have the inclination and the capacity for following a medical career. The idea is somewhat novel even yet, but when people have become more accustomed to it, and when women themselves have learned to have confidence in their own sex as medical attendants, the occasion for surprise will be, not that lady doctors should find opportunity to exercise their art and skill, but that they should have been so long shut out of a peculiarly appropriate sphere of labour. The truth is women doctors will always find their patients within the ranks of their own sex and of children, but in dealing with them, and especially with the former, they will certainly be exercising a fitting function. The fact that the University should for the second time have conferred the degree of B.A. on a lady shows that the cause of the higher education of women is progressing. This honour fell to the lot of Miss A. M. J. Heyne. But it was wholly in keeping with the fitness of things that, on the day when the first medical degree was conferred on a lady, medicine should form the subject of the oration. The address was given by Dr. Verco, and it was in every way worthy of the occasion. It was able, interesting, instructive, and hopeful. The speaker had every justification for claiming that medical science has made great strides here within the past few years, and in attributing to the University a large share of the credit for the improvement that has taken place. Undoubtedly it is a pleasing fact to contemplate that although only two years ago the colony was entirely dependent for its supplies of medical practitioners upon outside institutions, a change has now been made in that state of things. That Adelaide degrees should have obtained the recognition and status now accorded them is also a gratifying sign. The value of those degrees in the future will depend altogether upon the exertions and work of those who hold them. We heartily re-echo, therefore, Dr. Verco's plea for the development and maintenance of a truly scientific spirit by our University students and practitioners, believing that then we shall see them playing no inconsiderable part in the solution of the great and absorbing medical problems to which Dr. Verco so forcibly draws attention.
