Dear Huxley,

It is a bother about the Measurements Committee, because I fear at such short notice we could not gather a reasonably large attendance for the 13th. If you think well, I should prefer to let the date stand, communicating to the Committee any further suggestions you have in mind for amending the leaflet, and I hope, your general approval of the amendments which I sent to you and of the importance of having a second edition printed better.

We could, I think, even in your absence, make a useful start with the problem in our terms of reference of getting the archives better known and in more regular use, since I think we may agree that their potential value is great, but depends entirely on the accessibility of the material stored being fully appreciated.

On your second point, I should with pleasure, communicate the paper by yourself and Gross to the Royal. It is not a matter on which my sponsorship ought to carry any weight, but as I was for some time on the Zoological Committee, it will

at least not seem an intrusion if I communicate a Zoology paper.
