Dear Huxley:

Thanks for your letter of 25 September. I should be interested to see something of Artemia whether the work is done at King's or at University College. Perhaps he would be interested to come round and talk to me when he is in England, and possibly attend some of the lectures I am giving.

I am offering two courses each of one lecture a week:

- (i) On the logic of experimentation (essentially the principles of tests of significance in relation to the design of experiments).
- (ii) On the inheritance of quantitative characters.

I do not yet know what response, if any, these courses will meet with. Their success depends I imagine chiefly on how far Professors in other departments, in the University of London, advise advanced students and voluntary workers to attend them.
