Dear Huxley:

Many thanks for your letter. I fancy the idea of opposition on the Council is an illusion of Blacker's. He, of course, does not like it at all, and announced to the Council that you had changed your mind and were now opposing it, but when pressed the other day as to who on the Council he referred to as opposed to the Society's policy in this matter, he could only mention (i) Mallet, who proposed the formation of the Committee (ii) Gun who was among the original members.

Personally I believe the only real opponent on the Council is Drysdale, and that we have included all strains of intelligent caution on the Committee already.

I much regret that you will be so much away, as I should like to be able to consult you about this Board of Control Committee on Sterilization, which I am in for during the

next six months or so.
