DENTAL SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIPS.

The Government has issued regulations made under the Education Acts, 1915-1923 for dental scholarships. The provisions were approved in Executive Council on Thursday. The regulations specify that the Minister of Education may grant three dental scholarships for the year 1927, and thereafter for so long as required one such scholarship annually for girls who have been resident and whose parents have been resident in the State for two school years prior to the making of the applications for such scholarships. The allotments will be made by the Minister on the recommendation of a board comprising the Director of Education (Chairman), the superintendent of secondary education, and the principal medical officer of the Education Department. The board may make its recommendations on any grounds it thinks proper and without necessarily having regard to the results of any examination. Each scholarship will exempt the holder from the payment of all fees other than those for supplementary examinations by the University of Adelaide, the Adelaide Hospital, and the dental hospital in the course for the degree of Bachelor of Dental Surgery; will also entitle the holder to the use free of charge of all necessary instruments and text books; and, further, will also entitle the holder to receive a maintenance allowance of £25 per annum (to be paid in three instalments, one at the end of each University term). Applicants must be 17 years and not more than 21 years of age on March 1 following their applications, and must have passed the examinations and complied with all other requirements necessary to entitle them to enter the dental school of the University of Adelaide. Applications in writing must reach the office of the Director of Education before December 1 of each year, but the Director may in his discretion receive any entries after the due date. The regulations also refer to the duties of holders of scholarships and make provision for an agreement with the Minister of Education and a guarantor to be approved by the Minister. On the completion of the dental course the student will be required to serve in the Education Department as a school dentist for four years at the salary for the time being applying to women school dentists, and in the event of her failing to complete such course within the period covered by her scholarship and any extension she shall serve the department for four years as a dental hygienist at the salary for the time being applying to school dental hygienists.
