STUDENTS' CONCERT Conservatorium Diplomas Conferred

Associate in Music diplomas were conferred in the Elder Hall last night by the Acting Vice-Chancellor of the University of Adelaide (Professor R. W. Chapman) upon Laura Evelyn Finch and Leta Edith Reimann. The Elder Scholar for 1933 (Marie de Laplato Sleight), the Eugene Alderman Scholar (Peter Mathews), and the Public Examinations in Music Scholars (Beatrice Joan Shephard and Althea Mary Upton) were presented to Professor Chapman by the Dean of the Faculty of Music (Professor Harold Davies).

A standard of general excellence was displayed in the concert that followed. Beryl Kekwick sang Holbrook and Cyril Scott songs, Marlan Hardy the Bizet "Agnus Dei," and Charles Buttrose a recitative and air from Massenet's "Le Cid." Auber Campbell and Kenneth Ward contributed the popular duet, "Flow Gently, Deva," and Alan Cheek the Schubert "Erl King." Compositions of Chopin and Scriabin were played by Helen Wimble, and the former composer's E minor concerto romance by Marjorie Denholm. George Hooker's violin solo was the first movement of the Grieg sonata in F major, and Marie Coghill's a Vivaldi concerto excerpt. As organ solo, Gordon Bowen played some Geoffrey Shaw old English carol variations.

Frank Bridge's string quartet "Idylls" was contributed by Harry Hutchins, Hartley Williams, Eric McLaughlin, and Clifford Roennfeldt, and the first movement of Dvorak's A major piano quintet by Enid Petrie, Harry Hutchins, George Hooker, Kathie Yoerger, and Juliet Savage.

The accompanists were Misses Alice Meegan, Jean Barbour, Gwen Paul, Topsis Doenau, and Joyce Rofe.

LEAVING FOR ENGLAND

Prof. Mawson on Science Trip OFF TOMORROW

Sir Douglas Mawson, professor of mineralogy and geology at the Adelaide University, will leave for England tomorrow on the Strathnaver. He will be absent about three months.

Sir Douglas is going to England on behalf of the British-Australian and New Zealand Antarctic Research Expedition. He is making the trip at his own expense. While he is in England Sir Douglas will show the film made by Capt. Frank Hurley of the 1929-31 expedition. This picture was exhibited in Adelaide as "The Siege of the South." It will be first shown to the Royal Society. It is hoped that arrangements can be made for English theatres to feature it. Funds received from this will be used for the publication of research results obtained during the expedition.

SPECIMENS FOR MUSEUM

Sir Douglas is also taking with him some special specimens obtained during the expedition to the Antarctic. Some of these are pycnogons, commonly known as deep sea spiders. These specimens, which are the largest of their kind ever captured in the world, will be presented to the British Museum. Several are nearly 3 ft. long. They resemble a "daddy long legs" spider. The specimens which Sir Douglas is taking with him were obtained at a depth of 7,000 metres.

Sir Douglas will also take some rocks specimens for the British Museum. Sir Douglas thinks that by the showing of the Antarctic film and the specimens, much light will be shed upon the geology of the Antarctic continent.

Specimens will be given to the Cambridge University and other institutions. Sir Douglas, who is general editor of the expedition's research publications, will consult with many specialists, who are preparing their investigations for publication. There will be more than 80 parts to the publication dealing with the 1929-31 expedition's research.

VISIT TO EXPERTS

The specimens obtained during the voyage have been separated into groups. Prof. Harvey Johnston and Sir Douglas have asked the leading expert in the world on the particular group to deal with it. Specimens are sent to him and the results are published in the language of the investigator.

More than 50 different experts of every nationality are engaged on this work, and it takes years before finality is reached. Sir Douglas may visit Europe to see some of these specialists.

Sir Douglas says his visit is purely for business. He will return to South Australia after the year's work has begun at the university. He has been granted extra vacation leave. In his absence Mr. C. T. Madigan will be acting professor of geology at the university.

Sir Douglas may return to Australia by way of America.

NEW DIPLOMA IN PHARMACY

University Innovation

A diploma of pharmacy which is to be awarded next year, has been decided upon by authorities of the University of Adelaide.

Candidates who fulfil the conditions set out in the clause governing the new diploma are to be styled Associates of the University, and entitled to use the letters A.U.A.

To obtain the diploma, candidates will have to attend courses of instruction and pass examinations in inorganic chemistry, organic chemistry, volumetric analysis, and drug assay, botany, materia medica, forensic commercial pharmacy, practical pharmacy, and produce evidence of having fulfilled the conditions of practical experience required by the Board of Pharmaceutical Studies, which is to be appointed annually.

The present committee consists of the Chancellor and Vice-Chancellor of the University, the Angus Professor of Chemistry, the president and secretary of the Pharmaceutical Society of South Australia, the president of the Pharmacy Board, Dr. W. T. Cooke, Dr. S. W. Pennycuik, Professor C. Stanton Hicks, and Mr. E. F. Lipsham. The Angus Professor of Chemistry will be chairman, and Professor A. Killan Macbeth, the present occupant of that chair, will be the first chairman.
