Since the last edition of the Digest, we held the ROCA AGM in October at which we made a significant change to the ROCA Constitution so that membership fees were abolished and the ROCA membership categories were clarified. Having no joining fees brought us into line with the rest of The University of Adelaide Alumni groups. It is the committee's hope and expectation that this will allow ROCA, with the help of the Alumni, to actively canvas all students who spent more than a year studying at Roseworthy and former staff to join ROCA. We believe that there would be in excess of 4,000 people who fit these criteria that we want to reconnect with.

As I meet former students at various ROCA and University functions I am surprised at the number of non-ROCA members I come across. We are hoping that with a little encouragement we will be able to increase our membership numbers.

ROCA has one of the larger Adelaide University Alumni groups which has meant the level of awareness of University of Adelaide development plans and policy by our

members has been enhanced by the ROCA communication channels. Hopefully many of you responded to the recent by-election for a casual vacancy in the University of Adelaide Council. This was caused by the resignation of Professor Simon Maddocks who has taken up a position as Vice Chancellor of the Charles Darwin University in Darwin. Both Professor John Radcliffe (who is also a sitting University of Adelaide Council member) and Professor Maddocks are well known for their support for agriculture and perhaps it is no coincidence that ROCA members may have helped their election. A full University of Adelaide council election will occur around September. You are all encouraged to firstly scrutinize the candidates for a connection to Agriculture and secondly carry out a valid vote. This process is done by email and will not take much of your time. The University of Adelaide recently achieved a World University Top 3 ranking in the discipline of Agriculture and Forestry. This stand out recognition amongst the other schools of the University is testament to the quality of Agriculture research and education the School of Agriculture has delivered. It is also testament to the University Council's contribution to leadership, policy and planning and so your vote at Council election can be quite significant.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank those committee members who have left and welcome those who

have joined. Mark Seeliger has served as President and committee member for many years. He was awarded the honor of Alumni Fellow by the University of Adelaide Alumni in recognition of his contribution to ROCA. The other committee changes include Tracey Parkes who served as our Secretary, Paul Mansfield as our Treasurer and Mike Wake as our Eyre Peninsula representative.

New members on the committee include Mark Langman as our Eyre Peninsula rep, Kym Hudson as our Riverland rep and Lucy Coward.

Alan graduated from Roseworthy in 1972 with an RDA, earning the Gold Medal. He then went on to do the RDAT, and graduated in 1973.

He spent the next ten years honing his skills on several sheep, beef and cropping properties.

In 1983 he began his career with the ABC in Rural Media and worked his way up through the ranks in both Western Australia and South Australia. He has received numerous awards for Rural Journalism during his thirty-year association with the ABC - the latest being in 2012 when he received the

prestigious award from Rural Media SA as a 'Rural Media Icon'. He was the 6th person to receive such an Award.

Alan spent the last thirteen years as the Regional Production Manager at the Mount Gambier ABC station. There would not be too many rural people in the South East, or throughout the state of South Australia, who have shown the commitment that he gave to his job. Whatever task he tackled he left behind innovation, attention to detail and a high standard for others to match.


MEMBER CONTACTS

NEWS FROM THE ARCHIVES

Mapping the past helps us understand where we come from. A small group of volunteers continues to beaver away at cataloging, scanning, indexing, translating and so on, slowly examining a huge amount of Roseworthy material for the rest of us to peruse at considerably less effort than it is looking through the raw sources.

We continue to regularly get pieces from former students and their families. Recently a family member of Charles Drew (RDA 1927) handed in a 1927 STUDENT. The University archives have very few STUDENT Magazines from the 1920's so it was most welcome.

We urge any past students or their descendants to donate or lend or let us copy materials that are related to Roseworthy. It all helps to build a better picture. However, photographs without names or identification are less useful.

In 2012, the University of Adelaide Art and Heritage Collections purchased a sterling silver ink stand by Auction from a private collector. As you can see in the photo the backdrop is the façade of the Main Building at Roseworthy. It has a date of 17-7-1914 which is the year Professor A.J. Perkins became Director of Agriculture for South Australia after being the Principal

of Roseworthy College since 1904. We think this may have been a parting gift to Professor Perkins but it would be good to solve this historical riddle.

FIRST DOCTOR OF VETERINARY MEDICINE ABOUT TO GRADUATE

Late last year a number of the ROCA Committee attended a Valedictory Ceremony, Veterinary Oath and Prize Awards held at the Roseworthy Campus to celebrate the impending graduation of 38 Doctor of Veterinary Science students. Professor Wayne Hein, Head of School of Veterinary and Biomedical Sciences, James Cook University, Townsville, Queensland, who is also a graduate

of Roseworthy Agricultural College (1970) delivered the Valedictory speech. That evening staff and students celebrated at a dinner held in Gawler.

It was a real pleasure to witness the culmination of hard work and perseverance of both staff and students. Seeing the final year students take the Veterinary Oath led

by Dr Roger Paskin (Chief Veterinary Officer) brought home the realization that they had arrived.

The formal Graduation will take place later in April but by then many of the Graduates will be spread across Australia, New Zealand and beyond as they start their careers.

ROCA PRESENTS RA&HS 175TH ANNIVERSARY BOOK TO THE UNIVERSITY OF ADELAIDE

The historic link between the Royal Agricultural & Horticultural Society of SA and Roseworthy Agricultural College has been commemorated by the presentation of a leather bound collectors' edition of the RA&HS 175th Anniversary History Book, "Sharing the Good Earth; 175 Years of Influence and Vision" by ROCA to the University of Adelaide.

ROCA President, David Spencer and RA&HS President, Richard Fewster jointly presented the book to Adelaide University Pro Vice-Chancellor, Professor Richard Russell AM.

The collector's edition will be lodged in the Roseworthy Campus Library for use as a valuable reference source by future generations of students.

Roseworthy Agricultural College owes its existence to the persistence and early foresight of the RA&HS during the late 1870's. As agricultural education in its scientific, theoretical and practical form was at the heart of RA&HS endeavour, it was felt the creation of an agricultural college was essential.

The RA&HS lobbied the Government of the day, assisted in the selection of suitable land at Roseworthy and

found the most appropriate candidate to become the inaugural Professor of Agriculture. Roseworthy Agricultural College was officially opened in 1883, becoming the first agricultural college in Australia. The first students graduated in 1886. Since that time, the RA&HS has provided ongoing support to Roseworthy students, including the annual presentation of a Gold Medal prize for the Dux of the agriculture course. In recent times, the RA&HS Education Foundation has also established a

scholarship in support of students studying at the Waite and Roseworthy Campuses of Adelaide University. Roseworthy's connection with the RA&HS even extends to their current President and Chief Executive.

RA&HS President, Richard Fewster graduated from Roseworthy Agricultural College in 1965, while RA&HS Chief Executive, John Rothwell spent many years on the staff managing Roseworthy's farming operations.

This year, the University of Adelaide celebrates its own 140th Anniversary and the intimate relationship between the University and the RA&HS over that time is a full story in itself.



UP-DATING THE HONOUR BOARD

AN APPEAL FOR NAMES

It is planned to up-date the honour board on the back wall of the Roseworthy Memorial Chapel with the names all those who saw active service post World War 2. There have been over 19 conflicts since WW2 that Australian defence personnel have been involved in, which qualify for active warlike service. We believe we have all the names of all those from the Vietnam period. Outside this period we believe that a number of students from Roseworthy College / Campus (post 1990 when the University of Adelaide took over) have chosen a career in the military. Some of these would have seen active service and it is these we want to capture. To be consistent with past practice, to qualify any past

student or staff member must have been at Roseworthy for at least one year. This work will have to be done largely by word of mouth as I am uncertain if we can match our graduate data base with defence records. We will investigate this, but I am not hopeful.

ANZAC CENTENARY & ROSEWORTHY

The ROCA Anzac Centenary Appeal has raised \$2270 and the appeal is still continuing. Special thanks must go to Harry Stephen for his most generous donation. Thanks must also go to the 16 other donors.

The ROCA Committee together with a small group of veterans are organising a few activities for the coming ANZAC Centenary. A big event will be held at Roseworthy on Anzac day 2015 to commemorate the service of those students and staff who saw active service. R.O.C.A. over the last 114 years has been strong in recognising the military service of its past students and staff.

I would like to think we will do this commemoration with a minimum amount of patriotism and drum beating. I recently attended some writers' week talks by Paul Ham and Margaret McMillan who have just written book on the causes of WW1. We have learned a lot since then, and the Memorial Chapel at Roseworthy was erected by those returned soldiers from RAC, to remind us of the tragedy of war. Unlike 100 years ago when everyone was swept up by patriotic fervour and rushed off to enlist, in this digital information age, with these memorials dotted all over the country, it can only be hoped that current and future students of Roseworthy will have more wisdom and foresight rather than relying on hindsight.

ROSEWORTHY COLLEGE – COMMEMORATION OF THE 32 STUDENTS WHO WERE CONSCRIPTED UNDER THE 1964 NATIONAL SERVICE ACT

18 of the 32 former students of Roseworthy Agricultural College who were conscripted into the Australian Army as a consequence of the 1964

National Service Act, attended a small ceremony at Roseworthy Campus on Saturday 22 March to commemorate their service in the Australia Army, during those Vietnam War days. The names of these 32 have been engraved on a brass plaque which was unveiled on the day. Most of those attending on the day, together with wives and

partners adjourned afterwards to the Rising Sun Inn at Kensington Park for a dinner and a few “furphies”.

It has taken since 2008 to gather the names and organise a place for the plaque. It is now on the left immediately after you enter the main foyer at Roseworthy Hall (the main building). At the eleventh hour we discovered another veteran in the suburbs who needs to be allocated a place on the plaque; Russell Miller. Russell spent one year at Roseworthy in 1964. He went to Vietnam in 1967 with 2RAR and upon his return went into primary school teaching.



We are oversubscribed with contributions from our national servicemen to cover the cost of this plaque, receiving to date \$1120 with cost being just \$868. The surplus of \$252 will go to the ROCA ANZAC Centenary Appeal account, subject to the consent of the blokes.

ROSEWORTHY CAMPUS AND STUDENT FUND (RC&SF)

On the 4th of December last, David Spencer (ROCA President) and I were privileged to attend by invitation the Valedictory Ceremony for the first graduates of the Doctor of Veterinary Medicine course at Roseworthy Campus.

There were 35 successful graduates many of whom were award winners including Stephanie Warwick who won the Hon. Doctor Bruce Eastick Prize for the most academically outstanding student.

We congratulate Stephanie for her outstanding result and commend also all other prize winners.

We thank sincerely Prof. Kym Abbott as well as the Campus community for their kind invitation and hospitality on the day. We thank also Bruce Eastick who personally made the presentation to Stephanie.

ROCA through RC&SF provided funding for the prize which we hope will become a feature of our ongoing activities.

Caitlyn Page is a second year Veterinary Bioscience student who stayed at the farm during summer vacation.

"Living on the farm, getting involved in the daily activities and also the community events, was an experience I would recommend to any student. I felt like I was part of the family for the week which really heightened my learning – I was comfortable asking questions and they took the time to explain," she said.

Caitlyn said the experience gave her an insight into organic farming and alternative ways to run a sustainable farm.

I was able to observe and practice many animal handling tasks taught in my course. It wasn't shearing time but this meant that I learnt about other vital aspects such as vaccinations, supplements and how to improve soil health."

Yaringa Alpacas farmer, Susan Haese, has welcomed Roseworthy students onto her property for four years. Ms

Haese says farmers should get involved in student teaching but should ensure they plan their time wisely.

"You need to be prepared to teach them and send them away with a learning experience," Ms Haese said.

Ms Haese says the alpaca industry is developing from a lifestyle to livestock industry and the curriculum at Roseworthy is matching that.

"Veterinarians don't have as much familiarity with alpacas, but the new graduates will."

Emma Hoolihan is a former radio journalist currently in her second year of Veterinary Bioscience at Roseworthy. Hailing from Gawler Belt, Emma travelled to West Africa and New Zealand as an agriculture and general news reporter. She now works casually at the Roseworthy Research Dairy and hopes to specialize in large animal practice and national biosecurity.




