### 3,267 CANDIDATES FOR UNIVERSITY EXAMINATIONS

The largest number of candidates on any one day sat for the 1934 University public examinations yesterday. The centre hall and the eastern and western annexes of the Exhibition Building, the Brookman Hall at the School of Mines, and the old chemistry buildings, the old library, the law south room, and the history room at the University were used to accommodate the 3,267 candidates in the morning and afternoon. In the morning 1,520 sat for intermediate English, in addition to which there were 17 leaving agricultural science students and 63 leaving honors chemistry candidates. The 1,520 intermediate candidates who took English in the morning sat for English essay in the afternoon. Also in the afternoon 114 leaving geography candidates were examined and 33 for leaving honors ancient history. The examinations will be continued today, when the subjects will be intermediate arithmetic and French, leaving botany and mathematics I., and leaving honors modern history and French.

### Fifth Year Medical Students To Assist At Hospital

Tomorrow the 12 fourth-year medical students, who have been assisting the depleted staff of eight house surgeons at the Adelaide Hospital, will be replaced by eight fifth-year students who have recently sat for examinations and four sixth-year students. These four sixth-year students will sit for supplementary final examinations in a few months' time.

It is expected that in February about 10 young doctors, who have just qualified at the Adelaide University, will become house-surgeons at the hospital, receiving the usual £100 a year, with board. Pay at the rate of £200 a year is offered to any of the present eight house surgeons, who are willing to remain another year at the hospital. Usually young doctors remain at the hospital only one year as house-surgeons. The required number of house-surgeons is 16. Usually one or two young doctors from the Melbourne University come to the Adelaide Hospital for a year.

### Prof. Lamb's First Graduate

PROFESSOR W. E. COOKE (late Professor of Astronomy at Sydney University) gives me an illuminating answer to "Old Oxford's" enquiry if any other Adelaide University student of the old period under the late Professor Sir Henry Lamb survives.

"I may say that I was the very first of Professor Lamb's students to graduate in physics and mathematics," he writes. "In fact, I had the advantage of private tuition in mathematics, as I was the only pupil in my year. In physics there were only two—Sir Walter Kingsmill and myself. Sir George Murray was a fellow-student, but he was earning all sorts of distinction along different lines. So was Dr. R. S. Rogers. I think we must be nearly all that are left of those days. What a wonderful growth the University has made since then!"

Mr. President Kelly, of the South Australian Industrial Court, was 36 yesterday. On the motion of Mr. T. A. Calerer, who said that thirty or forty young men in and around Adelaide would be glad to join them, a resolution was carried affirming the desirability of establishing evening classes at the University.
