**Sir Raphael Cilento**  
 South Australia is indirectly represented in the honors list by Sir Raphael Cilento, who was born at Jamestown in 1893. After a brilliant school and college career, he graduated in medicine at the Adelaide University. His wife, formerly Dr. Phyllis Cilento, also graduated at the Adelaide University.  
 Sir Raphael has specialised in the study of tropical hygiene, and is an authority on this subject. He graduated in tropical medicine and hygiene in London, together with his wife for his year against men from several other countries.  
 He contends that white people, with a proper study of hygiene, can live and work quite comfortably in the tropical parts of Australia.  
 Sir Raphael was recently appointed Director-General of Health and Medical Services for Queensland.

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**ADELAIDE "PREMIER UNIVERSITY CITY"**

**Professor Notes Changes In Eight Years**

Adelaide's position as the premier University city of Australia was unquestionable, said the Professor of Anatomy at Melbourne University (Dr. E. Wood-Jones) yesterday. On Saturday he returned to Adelaide after an absence of eight years, and was surprised at the progress of the University since he vacated the local chair of anatomy in 1927. He said that when he was residing in Melbourne at that time, Adelaide gave the impression of being the real University centre of Australia, and his present visit had left no doubt in his mind that this ideal had been realised, for in Adelaide he found a keener civic pride in the University than was evinced in Sydney or Melbourne.

The people here take a great interest in the work and growth of the University, Professor Wood-Jones continued, "and the average man knows more about its activities than his counterpart in other cities of the Commonwealth. The site of the University on North terrace brings it nearer to the ordinary life of the citizens of Adelaide, and it has always been a tradition here that wealthy families make regular contributions towards it. In Melbourne, on the other hand, we are entirely dependent on government."  
 No University, contended the professor, had accomplished more in the direction of knowledge of the native of Australia than Adelaide, in spite of the fact that a chair of anthropology had been endowed in Sydney. In this regard was remarkable and had helped Governments to obtain knowledge of the natives before enforcing laws closely concerning the aborigines.  
 Professor and Mrs. Wood-Jones returned to Melbourne by the express last night. The professor will attend the 22nd Biennial meeting of the Australian and New Zealand Association for the Advancement of Science, at which Sir Douglas Mawson will preside.

**Rear-Admiral Evans To Be Knight**

On the opening night, the president-elect, Sir Douglas Mawson, will give the presidential address in the Wilson Hall of the Melbourne University. His subject will be "The Unraveling of Antarctica." Two evening public lectures will be given in the same hall, by Dr. P. Marshall (deputy director of the Australian Antarctic Research, Wellington, New Zealand), on "Volcanoes of the Pacific," and by Sir George Julius (Chief of the Commonwealth Council for Scientific and Industrial Research).  
 The Livestock Research Lecture will be delivered by Sir David Orme Mawson (the Emeritus professor of chemistry in the University of Melbourne), and the address in Agricultural Chemistry during the last half of evening.
