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Among those who will have degrees con-ferred upon them by the Chancellor at the University Commemoration on Wednesday ladies figure prominently. The degrees of Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Sur-gery will be given to two young ladies, one a daughter of Mr. G. W. Cooper, well known in the mercantile world, and the other a daughter of Mr. F. Chapple, B.A., B.Sc., head master of Prince Alfred Col-lege. These ladies represent one-third of the graduates who have gained the medi-cal degrees this year. Miss Annie Lane is the only Master of Arts for the year, Miss Winwood, who will receive the degree of Bachelor of Music, is the only graduate to gain this distinction.

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UNIVERSITY COMMEMORATION.

The commemoration in connection with the University of Adelaide will take place in the Elder Hall on Wednesday afternoon. His Excellency the Governor will be pre-sent.

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Miss E. Williams, who has been awarded the Tennyson gold medal for literature at the University higher public examination, is the eldest daughter of the Rev. G. S. Williams, Congregational min-ister of Maitland. Miss Williams has just completed a four years' course of study at the Advanced School for Girls.

ELDER CONSERVATORIUM.

The final concert of the season by the students of the Elder Conservatorium at-tracted a large audience to the Elder Hall on Monday evening, when additional inter-est was lent to the proceedings by the conferring of diplomas and distribution of prizes, which took place during the "inter-val." The musical portion of the pro-gramme was of the average length, and contained selections by almost all the best students of the institution, who gave an excellent account of themselves. Among those who may be singled out for special praise mention should be made of Mr. Brewster Jones, who played Chopin's "Ballade in G minor" for pianoforte with great skill and artistic refinement. His treatment of the delicate opening passages was admirable, and the more vigorous por-tions of the work were given with fine spirit and brilliancy. An equally good perfor-mance came from a young pianiste of the gentler sex, Miss Vera Goss, who, playing from memory, like Mr. Jones, revealed un-usual talent in her rendering of Lachner's "Prelude and toccata." The prelude was presented with fine force and judgment, and in the latter movement the student re-vealed a particularly clear and even technique. Special interest attached to the rendering of a couple of songs from the pen of Miss Maude Paddy, entitled "Renuncia-tion" and "A song of summer," by Miss Katie Joyce. These little compositions give evidences of a natural gift for writing fine melody, and modern ideas of what an accompaniment should be. The writer has obviously followed good models, and avoid-ed any suggestion of the shop ballad. The two numbers were sung with much intelli-gence and appreciation by Miss Joyce, who, with the composer, was recalled. Miss Martha Bruggemann showed that she is making advances as an oratorio singer in her interpretation of the aria "Hear ye, Israel," from Mendelssohn's "Elijah," and the contrast in sentiment between the two sections of the aria was capably marked. Mr. Fritz Homburg displayed a good strong tone and fair technique in his two cello items, the "Andante" from Goltermann's "Concerto in A minor" and Popper's "Ga-votte," and Mr. Harold Parsons gave much pleasure by his expressive performance of Saint-Saens's "Concerto in A minor," for the same instrument. The spirited finale of Mendelssohn's familiar "Violin concerto in E" received a brilliant treatment at the hands of Mr. William Cade. Mr. Mau-rice Chenoweth sang the well-known "Salve dimora" excerpt, from Gounod's "Faust," with appropriate passion and generally good effect; and Miss Violet Parkinson gave an excellent account of herself in Henselt's "Variations, op. 1," for pianoforte. The Conservatorium String Orchestra, led by Mr. Eugene Alderman, and conducted by Mr. H. Heinecke, opened the proceedings with Hofmann's "Serenade in D major," in which they manifested a good ensemble, satisfactory intonation, and generally gave evidences of careful and adequate prepara-tion. These remarks also apply to their playing of Volkmann's "Serenade, No. 3, in D minor," in which the long cello solo was well sustained by Mr. Parsons. The pianoforte accompaniments were shared by Miss Paddy, Miss Parkinson, and Mr. Brewster Jones.

Dr. Barlow, the Vice-Chancellor of the University, who distributed the certificates and prizes, in his opening remarks stated that it was the second occasion on which there had been this public distribution. When the University Council made the ex-periment last year it was with some mis-givings as to the permanency of the function, but the large and appreciative audience be-fore him showed, he thought, that it had come to stay. He was glad that one of the candidates to be made an associate was a church organist, and he hoped that ere long many others would follow his example. He wished to express his gratitude to the Director of the Conservatorium and his staff for the excellent work they had accom-plished. He was sure that it had not been an easy task, and such work called for a director learned and tactful, and a staff both enthusiastic and devoted to their art. He felt sure that the success achieved showed conclusively that they had such a director and staff at the Elder Conserva-torium. Portions of Dr. Barlow's remarks were interrupted by some of the University students, who started a chorus at the rear of the hall, no doubt in emulation of the commemoration proceedings.
