UNIVERSITY EXAMINATIONS.
 The result of the Primary Examinations, conducted by the University of Adelaide, are published in another column. To-day is the day of entry for the junior, senior, and higher public examinations, and the junior commercial examinations in connection with the University, and Wednesday will be the last day for the junior and senior examinations in theory, and for all grades in the practice of music. The closing date for entries for all degree examinations, diplomas in applied science, diplomas of associated music, and advanced commercial certificate examinations, will be October 11, and for the Angus Exhibition examinations, the date will be October 17. From November 2 the examinations in junior and senior theory of music will be held, and those in the practice of music will begin on Monday, November 5. The degree and diploma examinations will begin on Thursday, November 8, and on November 15 the Angus Engineering Exhibition and junior and higher public examinations will be started. The senior public and junior commercial examinations will begin on November 20.

PUBLIC EXAMINATIONS.
 An analysis of the results of the primary examinations in connection with the University of Adelaide shows that the number of passes was well up to the average of previous years. Of 981 candidates who entered certificates were gained by 509, which represents a trifle over 51.3 per cent. It is interesting to contrast these figures and those of five years ago. On that occasion there were 851 candidates, of whom 433 were successful—a percentage of 50.8. In the subjoined table will be seen the number who entered and sat for the various subjects and the results:—

The unsuccessful candidates who are anxious to ascertain in what subjects they failed will find the information posted in the hall at the University. It is gratifying to note the increase which has this year been recorded in the list of country centres which have undertaken the examinations. Where formerly there were centres at Clare, Jamestown, Koolunga, Laura, Moonta, Mount Gambier, Narracoorte, Port Pirie, Elliston, and Yorktown, there have been added this year Mount Pleasant, Petersburg, Mount Barker, Gawler, Crystal Brook, Renmark, Barra, Kapunda, and Mannum. Several of these centres were only formed immediately before or since the examination, so that many candidates from the country will in future find the facilities nearer home. This extension, too, should result in even larger entries. These places are also centres for the junior, senior, and musical examinations—entries for which, by the way, closed on Monday last. Subject to the approval of the University Board, public examinations may be held at any place where a local committee, consisting of a secretary and at least two other gentlemen who are well known and who occupy responsible positions, is formed.

RHODES SCHOLARS.
 Mr. G. R. Parkin, LL.D., representative of the trustees of the late Mr. Cecil Rhodes, in reply to a communication from Sir George Strickland, Governor of Tasmania, on the subject of the qualifications necessary for Australian candidates for the Rhodes scholarships, says, in a letter dated July 11:—
 "After very careful consideration, and after consultation with the authorities at Oxford, the trustees have decided that candidates who have qualified themselves for exemption from Responsions under the Colonial Universities Statute, will not be excluded from competition on account of inadequate knowledge of Greek at the time of selection. A circular making clear this change of policy will be prepared and distributed before the next selection of scholars is made. I have submitted to Mr. Wylie, our representative at Oxford, your question as to whether candidates who had not passed a satisfactory examination in Greek before selection, would encounter difficulties in being accepted by some colleges at Oxford. He has replied as follows:—'Probably not if they were good men otherwise. If they came as "senior colonial students" the necessity of having to pass in the Greek of Responsions would probably be no serious bar to a college accepting them. It has proved no difficulty in the few cases in which it has arisen so far. In the case of a weak man it would.' I should now mention to you one or two points for the consideration of your committee of selection:—(1) I found surprise expressed at Oxford that it was possible, as mentioned in your letter, for excuse to be had from Responsions without a knowledge of Latin. Those whom I have spoken to seem to think that in framing the Colonial Universities Statute the adequate knowledge of Latin was taken for granted, and so in the anxiety to guard about Greek it was not mentioned. I think that a man who came without an adequate knowledge of Latin would find difficulty in being accepted by a college. (2) While a previous

knowledge of Greek will not be insisted on, scholars should know that no one at Oxford is allowed to go forward to the ordinary degrees till he has passed the Greek of Responsions. It is, therefore, extremely desirable that any scholar selected without a sufficient preparation in Greek should at once prepare himself to pass the Responsions examination in that language as soon after he enters Oxford as possible. I would myself strongly recommend that he should be here in time to take the examination which is held each year at Oxford soon after the middle of September. (3) At present the trustees conduct an examination equivalent to Responsions (including Greek) throughout the United States, those provinces of Canada which have not affiliated Universities, in Jamaica, Bermuda, and Newfoundland. There are difficulties of time and University terms which make it difficult to arrange these examinations for Australasia, although it can be done if found essential. Meanwhile, we would prefer that, if possible, scholars should come qualified through their local Universities. I think I have now touched upon all the essential points referred to in your letter. As I have said, an official circular will in due course be issued on the Greek question."
