UNIVERSITY COMMERCIAL CERTIFICATE.

To the Editor. Sir—A matter which is agitating the minds of students for the advanced commercial certificate, especially those who were fortunate in passing the final examination in commercial law, is that there is no recognition in either commercial law, accountancy, business practice, economics, banking, and exchange, or commercial geography, until the student has passed in the whole of the subjects. Thus, if a student should only take up one subject each year, and as accountancy is a two-year course, it would take seven years for a candidate to obtain the coveted diploma. When these classes were first suggested by Mr. Jacobs (the President of the Chamber of Commerce) I do not think it was contemplated that students should wait so long for a recognition of their labours, and if this rule is adhered to it may make the commercial classes very unpopular, and ultimately mean failure in the objects in view. What reason is there for withholding some kind of certificate that the candidate has passed in subjects from year to year? In most offices the subjects embrace different kinds of work, and those who pass in commercial law and business practice may not desire, say, to attend accountancy lectures. And notwithstanding their proficiency in the special work they have passed in there is no recognition by which they could prove efficiency and ability. As there is now a subcommittee appointed by the Adelaide University on commercial subjects, could not the present unsatisfactory rule be rescinded and a more popular method be adopted? If it is a question of expense, the pass candidates would not object to pay a small fee. The successful candidates feel that some sort of written acknowledgment should be presented to them, which would be helpful to them in commercial life instead of waiting for an unnecessary term of seven years, which to an unbiased mind is unreasonable. If there should be a failure to pass in a special subject the candidate would have to wait another year for each subject he failed in, and as the candidates are engaged in business during the day they are not on the same footing as ordinary University students, who can attend lectures and study during the day. If at any time the student should discontinue his studies, say through removal from the city, or otherwise, by depositing the various certificates he should receive in return a diploma for the subjects in which he has passed.

The Times of November 14 announces that among the year's distinctions which have been awarded by the Royal Society of London one of the two royal medals has been awarded to Professor Horace Lamb. There are two royal medals the awards of which, The Times says, "are submitted for the approval of the Sovereign. They were founded by George IV., and are given only for the two most important contributions to science published in the British dominions not more than ten years, nor less than one year from the date of the award. The first of the two this year is awarded to Professor Horace Lamb, for his investigations in mathematical physics." As The Times says, "An adequate appreciation of the value of the mathematical work of Professor Lamb is possible only to a few." Professor Lamb was from 1875 to 1885 Elder Professor of Mathematics and Physics in the University of Adelaide. He was then appointed Professor of Mathematics in Owen's College, Manchester, now part of the Victoria University, an office which he still holds. After his return to England he was elected a fellow of the Royal Society, in recognition of his researches in his special subject during his residence in South Australia. He continues to take great interest in the Adelaide University, and has repeatedly assisted in the selection of professors, and done a great deal of work in the selection of books for the Barr-Smith library. He has also represented the University of Adelaide at many University functions in different parts of the United Kingdom and Europe. It will be gratifying to Professor Lamb's numerous friends in this state to hear of this latest distinction which he has won.
