

Miss Ruby C. E. Davy, A.M.U.A., who has just qualified for the degree of Bachelor of Music at the Adelaide University, is the daughter of Mr. W. C. Davy, of Salisbury, grand-niece of the late Mr. T. Reynolds (an ex-Premier of South Australia). At an early age she won a scholarship in senior pianoforte playing, also appearing at several concerts in Adelaide with success. Miss Davy gained first-class passes in both junior and senior practical and theoretical grades at the University (in 1900 receiving the only special credit that was awarded in senior theory) also junior, intermediate, and senior honors of Trinity College. At a later period she matriculated, passing the senior public examination in seven subjects. In 1903 Miss Davy gained the diploma of Associate of Music at the Adelaide University, also the Associateship of Trinity College, London. In 1905 she completed the academical course in connection with the Mus. Bac. degree, but did not send in the exercise until this year owing to ill-health. Professor Peterson, of the Melbourne University, spoke in eulogistic terms of Miss Davy's work, and expressed himself as well satisfied with the exercise submitted, which was a setting of the Magnificat for solo voices and chorus, with accompaniments for a quintet string band and organ. It consisted of six movements, two being canonic. The final chorus is worked in the fugal form, and contains some exceedingly good five-part counterpoint. Miss Davy will receive her degree at the University commemoration in December.

## DEATH OF MR. ANDREW SCOTT.

A PROMINENT EDUCATIONIST.

A leading figure in South Australian educational circles has been removed through the sudden death of Mr. Andrew Scott, B.A. (Principal of the University Training College). The sad event occurred on Tuesday. Early in the morning Mr. Scott, who had on the previous evening seemed in splendid health, was seized with an affection of the heart, and expired at midday. There had been no suspicion of the malady, though he had lately complained of slight pains in the chest. Five years ago, on account of nervous breakdown, Mr. Scott visited England, and returned from his trip apparently quite recovered.

The deceased gentleman was a native of Leith, Scotland, and arrived in the State at an early age. He was educated at St. Peter's College, and taught there for about a year. When Prince Alfred College was started he received an appointment on the staff under Mr. Fiddian. Five years later Mr. Scott proceeded to Melbourne University, and obtained the degree of B.A. In June, 1880, he was appointed assistant master in Grote Street Training College under Col. Madley. After remaining there for 8½ years he returned to Prince Alfred College for three years. During the latter portion of his stay he was second master. After satisfactorily performing the duties pertaining to that office he re-entered the Education Department as Instructor of Pupil Teachers, when the position was created in 1892, as a result of the report of the royal commission on education. In 1897 Col. Madley was appointed Commissioner of Police and the Minister of Education (Sir John Cockburn) placed Mr. Scott in charge of the Training College, in addition to his other work. When the scheme for giving teachers the benefit of a University training was brought into operation in 1900 Mr. Scott was appointed to the responsible position of Principal of the Training College. Latterly he had found recreation in golf. Years ago he was one of South Australia's leading cricketers, and was included in the local team which first met the English Eleven in 1874. On that occasion he caused a sensation by bowling Dr. W. G. Grace with his second delivery to that famous batsman. Mr. Scott also took part in the first match against Victoria in the same year. He was an ardent amateur photographer, and did much to promote the success of the South Australian Photographic Society, of which he was for years one of the prominent officers. His specialities were copying and lantern slide for lectures and educational purposes, and much of his splendid work was shown at the various exhibitions of the society. He was also a capable musician, and for some time played the organ at Kent Town Methodist Church. Mrs. Scott died about nine years ago. The deceased has left one son, Mr. Douglas Scott, of Kilkerran.
