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This play was first produced in England at the Royal Court Theatre in 1959. At that time the war of national liberation that occupied the headlines was going on in Cyprus. John Arden has said that some of his action derives from what he was told about an incident in Cyprus; but he sets his play in an undefined time in Queen Victoria's England and the colonial war his soldiers have come from is never localised. Accordingly his investigation of the relation between war abroad and civil unrest at home is properly called 'an un-historical parable'. and can be applied to many wars in many places. This play is perhaps only dated in that its action is presumed to arise from the death of five civilians in a distant war. Ten years after it was written it takes a lot more than that to disturb our consciences. This 'un-historical parable' is the work of a historical and political imagination of a remarkable kind : and the parable is neither polemic nor doctrinaire. Serjeant Musgrave's Dance is a melodrama. It is a play of exciting and sensational action with a last-minute rescue for a conclusion, and a number of songs are included in the action. Some - like the National Anthem - are well known, and we hope the audience will join in the singing. They may also hiss the villain - if they can discover who he is.
