

This progress is shared by all, but to the few come the awards that are "the guinea stamp." There was on Monday evening a pleasant feeling of alert interest and sympathy, especially in the part of the hall set aside for students. There is something more than mere instruction in the musical training shared by enthusiastic young folk. Cordial and enthusiastic applause greeted the various items, and still more the bestowal of the diplomas and scholarships. The programme opened, as usual, with the National Anthem. Then "Come let us sing" (Psalm 95) (Mendelssohn) by the University Choral Class, conducted by Mr. Frederick Bevan, with Mr. Harold Wylde at the organ. The duet "In His hand" was rendered by Misses Thelma Martin and Ella Collins, and the solo with chorus, "Henceforth when ye hear His voice," by Mr. Alexander Cooper.

The platform vacated by the chorus was next the scene of the ceremony which crowns and completes the weeks and months of study. The Chancellor of the University (Sir George Murray), before bestowing, spoke of the great loss to the University from the resignation of Professor Ennis. During the 16 or 17 years he had been connected with the institution; he had proved himself to be a skilful artist and an efficient administrator. The cause of his resignation was a breakdown in health. All present would, he was certain, join in an expression of sympathy with him and Mrs. Ennis, and in the hope that the professor would be before long restored to health and the successful practice of his profession.

CONSERVATORIUM STUDENTS' CONCERT.

On Monday night at the Elder Conservatorium the final students' concert of the present season was given, and the Chancellor of the University (Sir George Murray) conferred diplomas on the following successful students:—Associate in Music—Gwendolire Adamson (pianoforte), Mrs. E. M. Attwill (singing), Harold John Gard (singing), Kate Levasseur (pianoforte), Mrs. E. R. Palmer (singing), Tryphena Grace Pynn (violin), Melita Wanda Riedel (pianoforte), Ada Winnifred Wordie (singing). The Elder Scholars, 1919:—Winefride Mary Leahy (singing), Selma Voit (singing), Doreen Stoneman (violin), Vi Doreen Gold (pianoforte), Reginald Joseph Coombe (organ). Eugene Alderman Scholar, 1919:—Eleanor Marion Gilbert (singing). Public Examinations (in music) scholars, 1919:—Muriel Edith Phillips (theory of music), Jean Florence Prince (practice of music).

The Chancellor made sympathetic reference to Dr. J. M. Ennis, and expressed regret at the loss which the University and the Conservatorium had sustained through his resignation. Dr. Ennis, he said, had filled the Chair of Music at the University, and had been Director of the Conservatorium for between 10 and 17 years. During that time he had proved to be a learned musician and a skilful and accomplished artist on the organ and the pianoforte, and a tactful administrator. The cause of his resignation, as they were aware, was a breakdown in his health, and the latest news from Melbourne was to the effect that he was seriously ill. He was sure the audience would join with him in an expression of sincere sympathy with Dr. and Mrs. Ennis, and in the hope that the doctor would make a speedy and complete recovery, and soon be able to enter again into the practice of his profession. (Applause.)

An excellent programme of vocal and instrumental music was carried out in creditable style. Mendelssohn's melodious setting to "Psalm 95" was tastefully rendered by the University Choral Class, the soloists and chorus showing careful training and nice appreciation of the tonal values of the beautiful work. Mr. Frederick Bevan was the conductor, and the soloists were Misses Thelma Martin, A.M.U.A., Ella Collins, A.M.U.A., and Mr. A. Cooper. Mr. H. Wylde, R.C.O., presided at the grand organ. Miss G. Adamson, A.M.U.A., gave a pleasing interpretation of Liszt's arrangement for the pianoforte of Schubert's "Wanderer." "Dear heart" (Sullivan) was

nicely sung by Miss Sylvia Jury. A violin solo, "Intrada from suite No. 4" (Ries), played by Miss Kathleen Meegan, A.M.U.A., was deservedly applauded. The air, "Ah, mon dieu," from "Le Prophete" (Meyerbeer), was admirably sung by Miss Elsa Wiltshire. Mr. Derrick Thompson displayed considerable skill in the violoncello solo, "Kol Nidrei" (Max Bruch), which was given with grand organ and piano accompaniment. "L'Amour! oui, son ardeur a trouble" (Gounod), was rendered by Mr. Harold Gard, A.M.U.A., with good effect. The pianoforte solo, "Etudes," opus 25, No. 7, and opus 10, No. 4 (Chopin), were sympathetically treated by Miss Kate Levasseur, A.M.U.A. Miss Hilda Lucas won unmistakable appreciation for her song, "Substitution" (Coleridge Taylor), as did Mr. Francis Halls for the cavalier songs with male choruses, "Marching along," "Boot, saddle, to horse, and away," and "King Charles" (Standford). A very clever exhibition of violin playing was given by Miss Gertrude Keogh in "Concerto" (Accolay). The song, "Villanelle" (Del' Acqua), by Miss Lily Sara, A.M.U.A., and the pianoforte solo, "Staccato Etude" (Rubinstein), by Mr. Frank Holman, each won unstinted applause, and both artists had repeatedly to return and bow acknowledgments. "A Pastoral" (Carey) was tastefully sung by Miss Ella Collins, A.M.U.A., Elder scholar. The concert concluded with an impressive performance of excerpts from Haydn's "Sixth Symphony" by the Conservatorium String Orchestra, under the direction of Mr. Harold Parsons, Mus. Bac., the wind parts being supplied by the organ with Mr. H. Wylde as organist.

Hardy, M.A.) says:— It has long been felt among students that a University magazine is sorely needed as a means of self-expression and as a bond of union. That desire has at last been realised, and with mingled feelings of hope and fear we thrust this child of our imaginations stumblingly forward on the stage of the world, feeling perhaps with Touchstone that it is "a poor thing, but mine own." The special characteristics of our life at the Adelaide University make some such means of expression as this almost necessary. We have no representative body for the students as a whole, though there are in the University many societies to foster the interests of individual schools or groups of enthusiasts. It is hoped, then, that this magazine may become the representative organ of the University, expressing the corporate desires of the students, and interpreting for them the spirit of University life. It has another purpose—to bring the University students into closer relationship with our national life. Professor Henderson has contributed an article on "University Life," while there are many other items which will be appreciated by students generally. It has been well printed.
