Mr. Stevens since his entry into the ministry has built or enlarged five churches—Keith, Victor Harbor, Yelpie, Newlandtown, and Morphettville Park. ADELAIDE UNIVERSITY

Important Business by Senate

A meeting of the Senate of the Adelaide University was held on Wednesday afternoon. The following clause was added to the regulations governing the granting of diplomas in arts, science, and applied science:—"A candidate who fails to pass in any subject of the first or second year shall again attend lectures, and do practical work in that subject to the satisfaction of the professors and lecturers, unless exempted by the faculty." The effect of the new clause is that no student, unless he again attends the lectures and practical work, will be allowed to sit for the September examinations, unless permission has been specially given.

Thompson Bursary in Commerce

Rules were adopted regarding the use of £150 paid to the University by the Adelaide Co-operative Society for the purpose of founding a bursary in memory of the late Mr. George Thompson, the first secretary and manager of the society. The bursary, which will be called "The George Thompson Bursary in Commerce," will be awarded to any person nominated from time to time by the Adelaide Co-operative Society. The bursar will be exempted from payment of all fees in the course of the Diploma of Commerce, and he will not, unless by special permission of the council, retain the bursary for a longer period than five years.

Bunday Prize for Verse

It was decided that the Bunday prize of £10 for English verse should be awarded in April next year to the successful writer of the poem or poems under the prescribed conditions. Formerly only one poem was allowed, and it was found that candidates would rather submit several short lyrics than one long work.

MR. MCCOY IN SYDNEY

THE IMPERIAL EDUCATION CONFERENCE

Sydney, November 28.

Representatives of the educational systems of 37 different parts of the Empire gathered in London in July last to attend the Imperial Education Conference. Australia was represented by Mr. W. T. McCoy (Director of Education in South Australia), and Mr. Frank Tate, who holds the same position in Victoria.

Mr. McCoy arrived in Sydney to-day from Vancouver, by the R.M.S. Makura. He said at the conference there was a series of most interesting debates, and the gathering discussed a variety of subjects, such as agricultural education, the provision of rural schools in sparsely settled districts, the scope of school medical services, the use of the cinematograph in education, and the classification and training of backward and mentally deficient children. Probably the most important direct result was a wider and deeper knowledge of administration and the work of the various education departments gained through direct intercourse with those controlling education in the various parts of the Empire.

South Australia was essentially an agricultural State, and consequently he was specially interested in what was being done in the way of agricultural education, and in the provision of rural schools in other parts. To gather information on these subjects he had visited Denmark, Sweden, and Ontario, and the results of his investigations were to form the subject of an extensive report to his Government.
