**PROFESSOR PHILLIPSON'S RESIGNATION.**

From "H. V. R."—"Taxpayer" in Friday's Register expressed his desire that "the rightful judges, the public," should decide whether Professor Phillipson is the victim of injustice. I would remind "Taxpayer" that the public is represented on the Council of the University, which received the report of the sub-committee, by certain members of Parliament who are elected as representatives of the public. I do not think "Taxpayer" pays very much in taxation.

**THE NEW ARCHDEACON.**

**The Rev. J. S. Moyes Appointed.**

The Bishop of Adelaide (Right Rev. Dr. Thomas) has appointed the Rev. J. S. Moyes, M.A. (rector of St. Bartholomew's, Norwood), as Archdeacon of Adelaide, in succession to the late Archdeacon Samwell. The new Archdeacon will probably remain at St. Bartholomew's, and, although he has definitely accepted the appointment, it is not yet known when the special service of admission to the archdeaconry will be held.

There are four Archdeacons in the Diocese of Adelaide, the three, in addition to the new appointee, being Archdeacon Clampett (in charge of the Strathalbyn district), Archdeacon Bussell (Port Broughton district), and Archdeacon Forster (south-eastern district).

Archdeacon Moyes is a native of South Australia, having been born at Koolunga in 1884. He attended the public schools of Gladstone and Narracoorte as a lad, and later went to St. Peter's College, achieving the honour of the "Young exhibition," and dux of the school in his final year. He then became a student at the University of Adelaide, and was ordained in 1907 at St. Peter's Cathedral by the Bishop of Adelaide. He then went to Port Pirie as assistant curate at St. Paul's Church, and remained there until the latter part of 1910. At that time he left for England, where he was appointed curate of the parish church of St. Mary, Lewisham, London, S.E. He ministered there for about three years, and then returned to South Australia, taking over the charge of St. Cuthbert's Church at Prospect. It was during his six years' ministry there that the new church was erected, and in 1919 Mr. Moyes received an appointment as rector of St. Paul's Church at Port Pirie. Two years later he was appointed to his present charge at St. Bartholomew's. Mr. Moyes has for a number of years taken a keen interest in the work of the University Student Christian Union, and as a delegate from this State on various occasions, rendered much appreciated service at interstate conventions. He was the organizing secretary of the healing mission in connection with the visit of Mr. J. M. Hickson. He has also done much to build up the C.E.M.S. in South Australia, and is a popular speaker at men's meetings.

Archdeacon Moyes comes of a family well known in South Australia, his father being Mr. John Moyes, of the Education Department, the former head master of the Port Pirie School, and now head master at Thebarton. Mr. M. H. Moyes, B.Sc., brother of Archdeacon Moyes, was a member of Sir Douglas Mawson's historic expedition to the antarctic, and throughout the war served in the navy. He at present holds the rank of Lieutenant-Commander. Another brother, Major A. G. Moyes, is the well-known international cricketer. During the war he served with the 48th Battalion, and was awarded the distinction of a Military Cross. He is at present the editor of The Sporting Globe in Sydney. The archdeacon is a son-in-law of the late Sir Richard Butler.

Professor A. J. B. Moore, Dean of the College of Pharmacy at the McGill University, Montreal, will visit Adelaide in July. Professor Moore, who is the father-in-law of Mr. J. H. A. Pilgrim, manager in South Australia for the Ford Manufacturing Company, is going round the world on a pleasure trip.

LONDON, May 25. Dr. D. Sumner, the Adelaide Rhodes Scholar, has been awarded his tennis blue at Oxford, and will play in the inter-University match on June 1.

**A CONFERENCE OF MUSIC TEACHERS.**

A conference of music teachers, similar to that held four years ago, is to be held at the Elder Conservatorium from July 13 to July 18 inclusive. The syllabus includes several interesting and instructive addresses by well-known exponents of the art of music, and a number of public recitals. Professor Davies (Director of the Conservatorium), when seen by a representative of "The Advertiser" on Wednesday, said:—"We should further the best interests of musical education as far as possible. This can be effected by bringing together the music teachers of the State, and so enable them to discuss the various problems which confront them. It is most desirable that we should get to know each other in order that we may more easily help one another, and the forthcoming conference will enable us to do this. Musical education in the last few years has, like education in general, undergone many changes, and it is especially along the lines of this modern development that we desire further enlightenment and a fuller interchange of ideas. The syllabus has been arranged to make the meetings as instructive as possible, and among other things, for the benefit of country teachers in particular, there will be a number of recitals and concerts, so that they may hear as much music as possible. The conference four years ago aroused a great deal of enthusiasm, and I confidently expect that the forthcoming meeting will be appreciated to an even greater extent." The following addresses will be delivered:—"Musical education" and "Form in music," Professor H. Davies; "The music teacher," Mr. I. G. Reimann; "The art of singing," Mr. Frederick Bevan; "Musical aesthetics," the Rev. Brian Wibberley, Mus. Bac.; "Folk songs," Mr. Clive Carey, Mus. Bac.; "Orchestral instruments," Mr. W. H. Foote, A.R.C.M.; and "Music in schools," Mr. Frank Gratton.

**PROFESSOR PHILLIPSON'S RESIGNATION.**

A special meeting of the Council of the Adelaide University was held on Friday afternoon. It lasted a little over an hour. At the conclusion the Vice-Chancellor (Professor W. Mitchell) declined to make a statement, but referred the reporter to the Registrar (Mr. F. W. Eardley). In reply to a question whether the publication of the report on the matter of the coaching of the son of Mr. A. G. Rymill had been considered, Mr. Eardley said that it was not on the agenda. "Arrangements have been made," he said, "for the continuance of the lectures at the law school during Professor Phillipson's leave of absence to the end of the year. Mr. P. E. Johnstone will act as lecturer on the law of contracts, Mr. E. W. Benham as lecturer on the law of property (parts one and two), and Mr. A. J. Hannan as lecturer on jurisprudence. The latter arrangement is conditional upon the consent of the Government." Mr. Benham and Mr. Hannan have previously been engaged in lecturing at the University on law subjects.

**PROFESSOR CORBIN'S APPOINTMENT.**

The council of the University of Adelaide will meet on Friday when Mr. H. H. Corbin's appointment as professor of forestry at the Auckland College will no doubt be considered. Mr. Corbin, who is lecturer in forestry at the University and consulting forester to the South Australian Government, returned to Adelaide on Sunday from a visit to Eyre Peninsula. He made the following statement yesterday:—"Having been engaged in professional work during the past week in places out of touch with Adelaide, I was interested to find on return to this city that prominence in the press had been given to my appointment to the professorship of forestry in the Auckland University. While I am glad to know that at the Auckland University I am considered worthy of so important an appointment, I am also gratified with the very kind references to my work in this country.
