The pass lists for the examinations for degrees in arts, science, medicine, and law in connection with the Adelaide University have been issued. The graduates this year are—
Bachelors of arts, Miss Anna Tridinger, Mr. J. H. Bonn, and Mr. Walter Tridinger; bachelors of science, Miss Ellen Ida Benham, Mr. H. B. Corbin, Mr. J. A. Haslam, and Mr. J. A. R. Smith; bachelors of medicine and surgery, Mr. Wentworth Cavenagh-Mainwaring and Mr. A. E. Gibbs; and bachelor of laws, Mr. Francis L. Stow.
Mr. Cavenagh-Mainwaring and Mr. Stow have each been placed in the first class, while the "honors" list in arts and science will be found elsewhere. Messrs. Stow and George Ash are the Stow prizemen this year. This is the third occasion upon which Mr. Stow has secured the Stow prize, and he now becomes entitled to the Stow scholarship, being the first to win this high distinction. The Stow prizes and scholarship were founded in memory of the late Mr. Randolph Isaac Stow, who was at one time a judge of the Supreme Court. The conditions of the former provide that "there shall be annual prizes, to be called the Stow prizes, for which undergraduates shall compete at the examination in laws in the third term in each academic year;" while the regulation with reference to the scholarship is—"Every undergraduate in laws, who at each of the first, second, and third examinations passed by him shall win (whether in consecutive years or not) a Stow prize, shall receive a gold medal, and in the certificate of his degree shall be styled the 'Stow scholar.'" It is worthy of note that the first student to obtain this scholarship is a son of the deceased judge, Mr. Cavenagh-Mainwaring has been recommended for the Eversand scholarship, and Messrs. J. A. Bonnin and R. H. Pallein—the former a second year and the latter a first year medical student—will receive Sir Thomas Elder's prizes for physiology. The list of those who passed in the examinations for the M.B. degree which appeared in Thursday's Advertiser included the names of Mr. Frederick John Chapple and Mr. James L. T. Ibbister, but they were not classified. The reason was that they, having previously obtained the B.Sc. degree, were not required to take up subjects common to the two degrees. It was only necessary for Mr. Ibbister to pass in anatomy, and for Mr. Chapple to satisfy the examiners in anatomy and botany. The results of the higher public examinations are published this morning. In the list of successful candidates in the musical examinations, published yesterday, it should have been stated that Miss Loessel, who passed first class in piano-forte playing, was instructed by Herr C. Pittmann, and the name of Miss Kathleen Julia Westwood (Adelaide College of Music), and Miss Beppj Gardiner (Miss Stombow) were accidentally omitted from the same class.

The Registrar of the University writes with reference to the pass list of the first year of M.B. and B.Sc., in which it was stated that Messrs. Chapple and Ibbister passed without being classified, that the statement appeared in that form because, being already Bachelors of Science, they were required to pass this year in anatomy.

Mr. F. L. Stow, who has passed the third year for the degree of Bachelor of Laws, in the first undergraduate who is entitled to the name of the "Stow scholar." The prize has to be won three times before the gold medal can be awarded, and the son of the late Mr. James Stow, to whose memory the scholarship was founded, is the first to be able to claim the honor. Mr. Stow passed his first year in 1870 and his second year in 1871.
