#### THE ADELAIDE UNIVERSITY.

One of the most valuable prizes offered for competition at the University is the Angas Engineering Scholarship, which was founded by the Hon. J. H. Angas, with the object of encouraging the training of scientific men, and especially civil engineers, with a view to their settlement in South Australia. The scholarship is tenable for three years, and is of the annual value of £200. The competitors must be graduates of the Adelaide University, and are examined in mathematics, physics, geology, chemistry, mechanical and engineering drawing. The successful scholar must proceed to the United Kingdom and there spend the whole of the time in articles to a civil engineer or as a student in a college or university. The first award was made in 1882 to Mr. G. Donaldson, B.A.; the second in 1889 to Mr. C. C. Farr, B.Sc.; and the third in 1892 to Mr. A. Wylie, B.Sc. There were three competitors at the examination for the scholarship which was held in March, and the result has proved unique. The council of the University, after receiving a report from the board of examiners, have had to arrive at the conclusion that Mr. Alfred Chapple, B.Sc., and Mr. Lawrence Birka, B.Sc., must be brocketed as equal for first position. This rather complicates matters, and it is not as yet known what arrangements will be made. Both these young men are old Prince Alfred College boys.

#### FLETCHER MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP.

At the meeting of the University Council last Friday the Chancellor (His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor) reported that the Fletcher memorial committee had resolved to devote the funds subscribed to the foundation of a scholarship in mental and moral philosophy in memory of the late Rev. W. Roby Fletcher. The committee felt, however, his Excellency explained, that the amount subscribed—£102 10s.—was inadequate, and he had been commissioned to enquire whether the University Council would be willing to supplement the sum collected. The council referred the consideration of the question to a special committee, which will report at the next meeting.
