MUSICAL NOTES.

The Public Examinations in music now being held in connection with the Adelaide University show a gratifying number of candidates. These examinations began in 1887, when the list was—Theory, junior division 28, senior none; practice, junior 35; and the candidates were examined at Adelaide, Mount Barker, Kadina, and Crystal Brook, with the result that 16 gained first-class certificates and 9 second class in theory, and 17 first class with 13 second class in practice. This year the candidates numbered:—Theory, junior 129, senior 35; practice, junior 137, senior 63; and the examinations were held at Adelaide, Mount, and Port Pirie. The passes in theory for the present year have already been published, but as Professor Ives, who is the only examiner, has to visit several country towns to meet the candidates residing at a distance, the practice results will probably not be known until about the end of the month. The disappointment caused to intending candidates through seeking to enter late might be possibly averted if the authorities would give adequate publicity to the dates.

Our London correspondent writes under date of the 20:—Of the candidates for the vacant professorial chair at your University recommended by Dr. Lamb in the report mailed through the Agent-General last week the best known to you is of course the Rev. H. W. Horwill. As he has been out in the colony and will moreover be influentially backed by his old friend the Chief Justice and others I need say nothing about him. A much more remarkable man from our English point of view is Mr. William Mitchell, M.A. (of London) and doctor of science (Edinburgh) whose credentials are of the highest possible character, and with whom both the Agent-General and Mr. Wicksteed were greatly struck. I do not know this gentleman myself, but I am told by those who attended his lectures at University College on education last session that he is an exceptionally lucid orator with a capital style. The fact that Mr. Mitchell is now lecturing in Scotland in connection with the University extension scheme would seem to confirm this estimate, as the audience attending the extension classes are composed mostly of cottage laddies and have been on improving terms and by no means easily pleased, indeed, very critical. Mr. David Murray sees Mr. Mitchell in Scotland, and was much pleased when he heard he was one of the four selected by Professor Lamb. Should this gentleman prove eventually the University's choice there cannot be a doubt he will be a great acquisition to Adelaide society. Everybody seems to like him and to have a good word for him. Mr. Jeremy Mashburn and Mr. Joseph Solomon are also Oxford M.A.'s, and possess admirable credentials, but I imagine the University's final choice is likely to lie between Mr. Horwill and Mr. Mitchell.
