Recently correspondence has taken place between the Teachers' Guild and the University Council with regard to the postponement of the preliminary examination on account of the epidemic of measles. On Friday the council considered the matter, and they have decided to hold the examination on the specified dates, viz., September 6 and 7, but they have extended the date of entry to Monday next, and the date of notice of withdrawal to Saturday, September 2. It is then necessary arrangements have been made to hold a supplementary examination on October 9 and 10, the last day of entry for which will be September 30. This would give candidates a much better chance, for even those who are well enough to attend have not been able to work with their usual enthusiasm and vigour since the classes have been so depleted.

THE PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION.

TO THE EDITOR.  
Sir.—When ministers of religion are appointed examiners by the Senate of the University it is reasonable to expect that those gentlemen reserve Scriptural texts for their respective congregations, and not intrude them into the examination papers which they are entrusted to write. Besides, it is unjust to many of the candidates to have a sectarian rendering of St. Paul's defence before the Governor Felix given to them to analyze.

UNIVERSITY LEASES.

Mr. BROOKER asked if the attention of the Commissioner of Crown Lands had been drawn to the following paragraph in the press from Torowai:—"In the institute this afternoon Mr. H. C. Lewis sold leases of the University lands lately conveyed into farms and grazing blocks at Gumboroo and Parawoo. The sale was one of the largest ever held in the north, the hall being crowded with buyers from all parts of the colony. Several Victorian buyers were also present. The whole of the 22 farms and grazing blocks, comprising in all about 15,000 acres, were sold, excellent prices being realized. The great demand for land was evidenced by the hurried bidding that prevailed throughout."

THE COMMISSIONER of CROWN LANDS said the Crown Lands Department had nothing to do with the University lands. He had not seen the paragraph.

THE COMMISSIONER of CROWN LANDS, in answer to Mr. BROOKER, said he would endeavor to obtain the prices realized for the University lands.
