Professor W. Mitchell, (vice-chancellor of the University of Adelaide) and formerly professor of philosophy, and Sir H. Hadow, vice-chancellor of the Sheffield University, have been appointed examiners for the degree of doctor of letters of Melbourne University. Sir Frank Heath, who will visit the Waite Research Institute at Lobrae today, is secretary of the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research of Great Britain. He will go to Kaitpo tomorrow during his stay in South Australia, and will leave for Melbourne on December 22.

Dr. R. H. Pullens will leave on Tuesday for Tasmania. He will go to the camp of field naturalists at Lake Fynton, where he will remain until January 2. Before returning to Adelaide he will make a motor tour of the island State lasting several days, visiting old aboriginal camps in the interests of scientific research. The Rev. K. J. F. Bickersteth, headmaster of St. Peter's College, will leave South Australia by the Orana on December 31 for England. He expects to be absent for two terms from the college, and during his stay in Great Britain will visit a number of schools to see the latest developments in educational work.

THE ANNUAL LUNCHEON.

The annual luncheon of the University Graduates' Association was attended by a large number of members on Wednesday. The tables were set in the Botanic Park, and the sunlight trickling through the trees on to the guests gave a picnic atmosphere which characterized the function throughout.

The Chairman (Professor Harold Davies), after proposing the loyal toast, said he hoped that early next year they would have a meeting to discuss the question of anthropological research. Two American scientists now on a visit to Australia had collected some valuable records, cinema pictures, and photographs of native life while at Wilgena, and they would be available. He hoped the new members of the association council would make themselves unmitigated nuisances during the year, and understood that to be their intention. He expressed a hope that the association would make itself a source of strength for the University, for which it was doing good work in a quiet way. In connection with the University Union building there was a purely technical matter which delayed the transfer of the land, and when that was settled the association would begin the erection of the premises. He hoped to see the foundation stone of the building laid next year.

Mr. E. W. Holden proposed the new graduates, and hoped that the time was not far distant when the students would be readmitted to the commemorative ceremony. They had gone to the University, he said, as a result of various impulses, but whether from a desire for knowledge or as a result of fortuitous circumstances they must have obtained some light from its gleams. When the graduates donned their hoods they assumed larger responsibilities, because of their training, and throughout their lives they should do everything conscientiously.

Mr. C. T. Madigan supported the toast. He pointed out that the great majority of the undergraduates had everything placed before them at the University, and did not get much time for original thinking. As a matter of fact, they ought to think more for themselves, because in their life work they had to compete against those trained to individual action. Therefore the best thing a university could do for young people was to teach them to think for themselves.

Miss P. Lade, in reply, said people would be surprised if they knew the prejudice which existed against women students at the University. Comparatively few realized the worth of a university training to women. Its value was not so much what they learned as the effect on the whole of their lives. They learned to judge more clearly and to think for themselves, so that even if they forgot everything taught they brought clear minds to bear on every problem. If there were more women students they would have more good citizens and better women.

Mr. A. E. M. Kirwood said a tribute to the Graduates' Association, the value of which he had realized as a newcomer to the State. After graduation, students tended to lose touch with a university, which was a bad thing. The lack of a students' association in Adelaide was regrettable.

UNIVERSITY DEFICIENCIES.

At the annual luncheon of the University Graduates' Association on Wednesday, Mr. W. R. Crocker, who responded to the toast of the new graduates, referred to what he considered deficiencies in the University. He stated that he spoke from experience and with a desire to improve the relations between the various faculties. Mr. Crocker asked whether a training at the University was intended to give only some status in a calling, or was it for something deeper? The function should be more than to produce a technician. A University man should be one who could approach the problems of his time from a different standpoint than other men. It seemed to him that the University failed in that matter, partly because of the lack of facilities for association between the students of the different faculties. That was a great disadvantage, and perhaps the University Union would do more than anything else to solve the problem. So long as they had the attitude that the really superior student took one course, and so on, they could not get the true university spirit and interchange of thought among the undergraduates. Possibly the Graduates' Association could find a way to overcome the difficulty. The government of the University, continued Mr. Crocker, was a democratic one, and it was practically in the hands of the old students. Those who had been graduates for three years elected the senate, which, in turn, chose the council. So far as he could see the senate had not played its part in the selection of the council in the past. When one heard complaints about the government of the University being somewhat oligarchic, it was realized that the senate was at fault; that was, the old students. He urged the graduates to interest themselves in the government of the University to which they owed so much.
