THE HONG KONG UNIVERSITY.

Among the delegates to the University jubilee celebrations is a former student, Dr. Henry Bross, Rhodes scholar for 1913, who left Adelaide to enter Christ Church College, Oxford, but while making a vacation tour in Germany at the outbreak of the war, was interned and kept as a prisoner until the war was over. During his internment he assisted in many educational classes. In 1922 he was appointed lecturer at the electrical laboratory at Oxford, and published "The Theory of Relativity," an introductory sketch based on Einstein's original writings. He has also translated a number of works dealing with recent researches in physics. He is spending a year in travelling on a lecturing tour, and on Thursday evening will address a meeting of the Graduates' Association on "Some Aspects of Modern Physics." Previous to Dr. Bross's lecture the Vice-Chancellor of the Adelaide University (Professor Mitchell) and Mr. A. Grenfell Price will explain to the association some of the plans of the recently-appointed committee, which is making active preparations for the erection of Students' Union Buildings and a War Memorial.

Among the visitors to Adelaide in connection with the University jubilee celebrations is Professor J. L. Shellspear, of Hong Kong University, where he holds the office of Dean of the Medical Faculty. He stated that there were 300 students at the Hong Kong University, where the courses embraced the faculties of arts, medicine, and engineering. The medical school was endowed by the Rockefeller Foundation to the extent of £150,000, and established chairs were those of surgery, medicine, and obstetrics. The Foundation had suggested that the University should create chairs of anatomy, physiology, and pathology, and this would doubtless be done in time. The medical course was six years, and there were 120 students, all Chinese, with one or two exceptions, and eight were women students.
