Dear Dr Allen,

I had a note from Goodrich on the Weldon prize, and suggested two names which I think should be considered; though, as you say, it is a difficult award to make. One is J. Fraser Roberts, who previously worked on the technical biometry of wool fibres, but has lately had the chance of carrying out a physical and psychological survey of the children of Bath, work which really deserves to be a model in such researches.

The other name is F.A.E. Crew of Edinburgh, whose work on some lines you perhaps know, but who has received probably less credit than he deserves for a long series of measurements of the reactions of rats, which he carried out in testing McDougall's claim of inherited learning.
