My dear Huskins,

Thank you for your letter. I am enclosing a typescript of the four independent comments on Lysenko's speech at the Agricultural Academy, which the B.B.C. arranged recently. As you will see most of my own time was occupied with quotations from the translation of his speech printed by the Science Section of the Society for Cultural Relations with the U.S.S.R. I

I suppose it will be some time before I have a copy of the material on tetrasomic linkage which I gave at Stockholm, but really I ought to write it up for independent publication.

Yes, I should be very glad indeed to visit Madison when I am next in the States. In my last two visits I have seen very little of Genetics, though I did stay a few days within reach of Coldspring Harbor, and there were a few geneticists, though not many, at the inaugural session of the Biometric Society. For the development of the subject it would be well worth while getting a few good geneticists into the Institute of Applied Statistics at Raleigh in North Carolina, where I imagine the subject is not now well represented.
