Dear Mr. Stevens:

[\*] I am glad to have your application for the post of junior research assistant at the Galton Laboratory. Your application seems to me on the whole a strong one. I propose to do as I have done in other cases and send you three offprints, representative of different aspects of the work of the Laboratory, in which I should expect the candidate appointed to become my right hand man on the mathematical side. The other sides however, are not without relevance, for I am making simultaneously an appointment of a junior geneticist, and both for the interest the work will have for you and the prospects of its progress, I should regard it as of great importance that different members of the Laboratory should share as far as possible, their scientific ideas and interests.

The papers will give you an idea of lines of work in which I am interested and I hope also they will give you an opportunity, when you have read them, of taking up any point

from them which seems to you deserving of further discussion and showing that you have it in you to assist in the solution of analogous problems.
