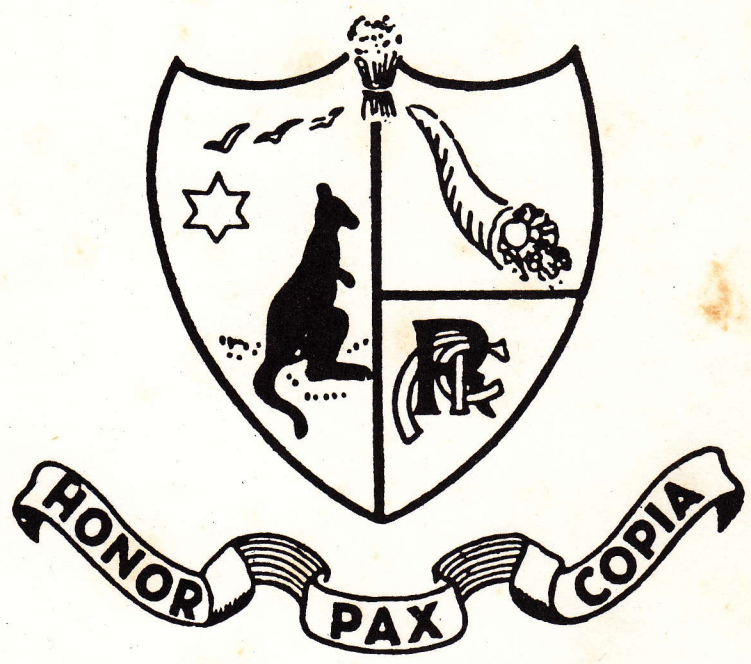

## THE SWIMMING POOL

### Background:

For many years the College Community made use of a swimming hole for their aquatic sporting requirements, and indeed strong water polo teams and fine swimmers have developed their skills in that rather primitive but lovely facility. However, as the community grew, so did the micro-biological count, until finally the old pool had to be closed due to health risks. The Old Pool is still in use, but now as an Aquatic Reserve for the Natural Resources Course.

While that story played itself out, a group of people had been steadily working towards raising money for a modern pool. Approaches were made to the Playford Government for a subsidy and had we raised sufficient funds, we would have received a pound for pound grant! Alas, it took many Open Days and fund raising events to gather enough finance to even start planning a pool and the pound for pound subsidies have long since dried up.

A twist of fate in 1978 rekindled interest in the pool and the Student Union Council gave things a shot in the arm with a donation of \$10,000. Planning began in earnest.

A less agreeable twist of fate saw the potential funds available diminish and the cost of the project increase, but the College had its head down and was not to be thwarted. A loan of \$30,000 was taken out to enable the project to commence.

### Design

The concept of the pool complex is novel and specific to the requirements of the College Community. It caters for competitive swimming, diving and water polo and provides a substantial deep section for scuba training. This main pool is 25 metres by 12.5 metres.

However, the main pool is too deep for beginners and small children, so a small pool (9.5m x 7m) was included adjacent to the main pool. It also acts as a balance tank for the main pool.

Changing rooms and toilets provide on site facilities to comply with the Health Act and the Plant Room and store room complete the Change Room Block.

A special feature of the Pool is a hydrant enabling fire units to quickly and efficiently draw water from the pools for fire fighting purposes.

Lighting for night training and competitions and diving boards are some of the things Open Day funds this year helped us pay for.

The Roseworthy Old Collegians' Association was initiated by several of the graduates in the late 1890's.

The objectives of the Association are:

## R.A.C. Table Tennis Club

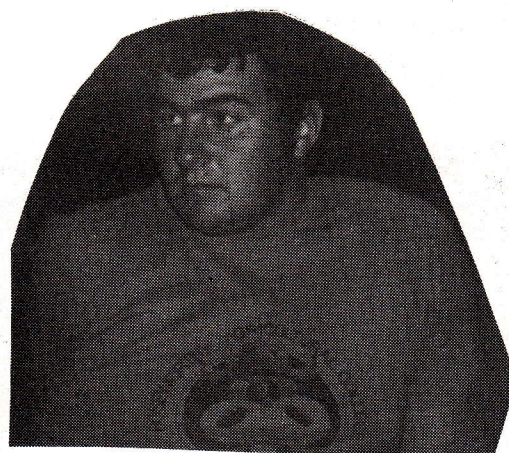

VITIS AUSTRALAISICUS

Much concern has been aroused lately in viticultural circles as to the sudden rise, from relative obscurity, of a new species of grapevine, Vitis Australaisicus. A collection is being established at Roseworthy College: here is a brief description of some of the varieties catalogued so far:-

Andrew Noon (Petit drew)

This is a pygmy variety, possibly due to in-breeding in the isolated McLarenvale area. It is very similar to the variety 'Greg Dixon', indeed, even such famous ampelographers as Dr. R. E. Smart have had difficulty in differentiating between them.

Brendan Darveniza (Daaarvo)

A slow growing variety from central Victoria. The leaves are thick, rough and undulating. It has one serious weakness however, in its susceptibility to "alcohol rot" (Cirrhosis Liverus).

Greg Dixon (Grog Doxon)

A north-west Victorian variety developed from a mutant strain of wheat. The leaves tend to be rough and are subject to galling. Produces wines which tend to be common and uninteresting.

John Liney (Balding looney)

Probably one of the earliest varieties to be successfully bred. The cuttings of this vine were purchased (for 30 pieces of silver at a bank in Canberra. There is a tendency for thinning of the canopy early in the growing season.

John Mushet (Sado-Macho-Munch)

A delicate species recently introduced from New Zealand. Renowned for its subtlety and finesse on the palate tending to "roundness". Characterised by drooping shoot growth. The vine produces enormous crops when trained to a "bilateral" cordon.

Jane Ferrari (Marria Ferrazio)

An Australian hybrid of Italian parentage. Hardy and robust, showing prolific shoot growth. The bunches are well filled with spherical-large berries, which are easily harvested (especially by Asian pickers). Makes a full bodied "gutsy" red, which is easily "fortified".

Lachlan Warner (Lord Lachy)

A pseudo aristocratic variety. Has developed from humble beginnings in the outback of New South Wales. The leaves are often having a pale-limp appearance. It is not recommended to be grown in mixed plots. Has an aversion to soils containing "carrotene" and "catnip".

Mark Purbrick (Pubes)

A variety developed at Ta bilk in central Victoria. Maximum vigour is obtained when grown in soil with a covering of "pet rocks". The most characteristic feature is the shape of the upper sinuses which are flared. Can be recognised in the vineyard by its distinctive varietal aroma.

Martin Shaw (Cl----head)

A variety grown chiefly in the Adelaide area. Characterised by hedging of the canopy. The wine has a subtle, unassuming austerity, tending at times to a coarseness on the palate.

Michael Blake (Blakey)

A hot-area variety, grown in the Mildura region. The vine displays upright cane growth, and leaves with sharp, angular teeth. Cultivation was unsuccessful this year, however, propagation of cuttings will be attempted next year.

Mike Brajkovich (Bryke 2,4,5-T)

This New Zealand hybrid of Dalmation parentage is notable in that it has "Sloping" canes and "webbed" leaves. It thrives when grown on a 3 metre trellis, and lends itself to the production of "high" quality table wines. At harvest, picking is aided by the use of ladders and cherry pickers.

Nick Walker (Strudel-Boomer)

This is a vigorous, upright-growing variety which is susceptible to fungus diseases such as "brown-eye". The fruit tends to be exposed when ripe and is well suited to the making of "Brute" Champagne styles.

Peter Barry (Clare-Honky)

A viticulturalist's nightmare, this variety is difficult to train. Its primitive features, small tight bunches with very short bunch stalks, are not likely to endear it to growers. It is prone to "mould" infection.

Rob Gibson (Penfolds' Delight)

Found growing at Nuriootpa. Displays vigorous, rather upright growth. This is a productive variety which has twice been successfully crossed with a New Zealand variety "Henderson Hotlips".

Roger Harbord (le Dogiēur)

This is a moderately vigorous variety with a "spreading" growth habit. When grown on the sandy soils of Westlakes it is susceptible to nematode infection. Fruit quality is not good for wine making, but is excellent for S.U.C.ing.

Rolf Binder (Rolfgang blunda)

An Australian hybrid of Germanic-Hungarian parentage - planted chiefly in the Barossa valley. Grows best on a low, wide trellis. The wine has an "assertive" character. Successful crosses have only been made with 12 to 14 year old clones of the "Frauleine" variety.

Rosemary Butler (Mar Butl̄ur)

A New Zealand hybrid developed by "Montana". Has rather slender shoots, and retains a high acidity, even in hot conditions. Opinion varies as to whether this variety evolved before, or after the variety "John Liney".

Stephen Hall (Angry - 4X)

A Queensland variety showing slow growth, and having a characteristic reddish appearance. The leaves are deep and hairy on the lower surface, with tufted hairs on the upper surface. The wine produced from this variety tends to be volatile when fortified.

Theodore Radke (Juers folly)

Another Queensland variety, hardy, and a prolific bearer of large, compact, freely "hanging" bunches, especially when lightly pruned with a bush knife. Grows "wildly" when subject to excessive "irrigation".

Colin Schappert (Sultana)

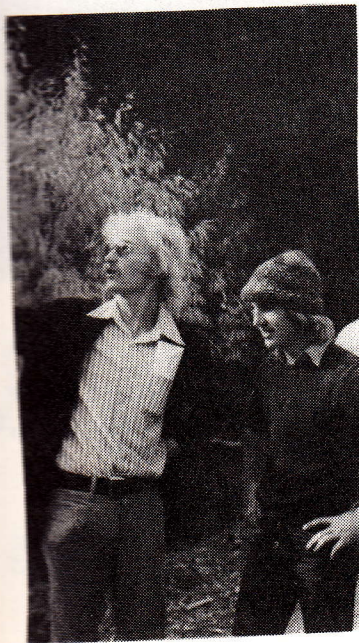
A variety unsuited to the climatic conditions at Roseworthy. It failed to grow.

Roland Kaval (Petit Poulet)

A variety originally grown in Victoria, but now established in South Australia. Thought to be a hybrid of Eastern European parentage. The shoots are slender, and of medium vigour. The leaves are razor sharp and prone to curling at the edges, their upper surfaces containing tufts of hair which usually disappear during the summer months. Although fruit size is small, it responds well to hormone treatment. The wine has been described as "Cheeky" with a certain complexity and a bitter aftertaste.

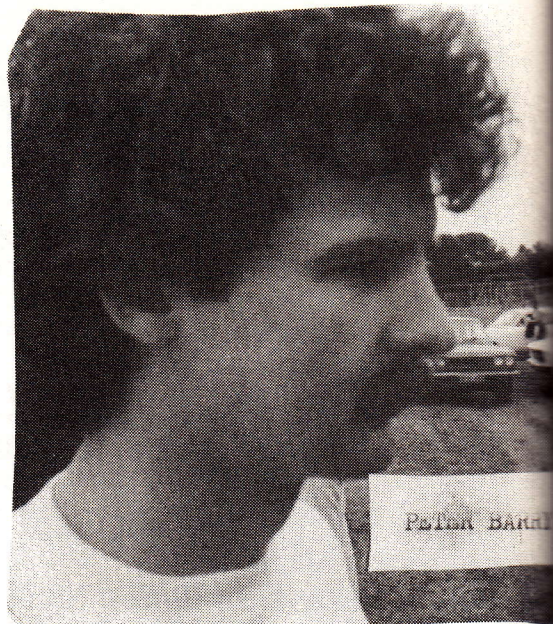
Chris Ringland (syn: Ringers-strain)

A New Zealand hybrid which is mainly used for the production of pink gin. The vine form often assumes strange shapes and is prone to sudden outbursts of shoot growth. It is a vigorous and erect variety, especially when grown in conjunction with the cultivar Infidel.

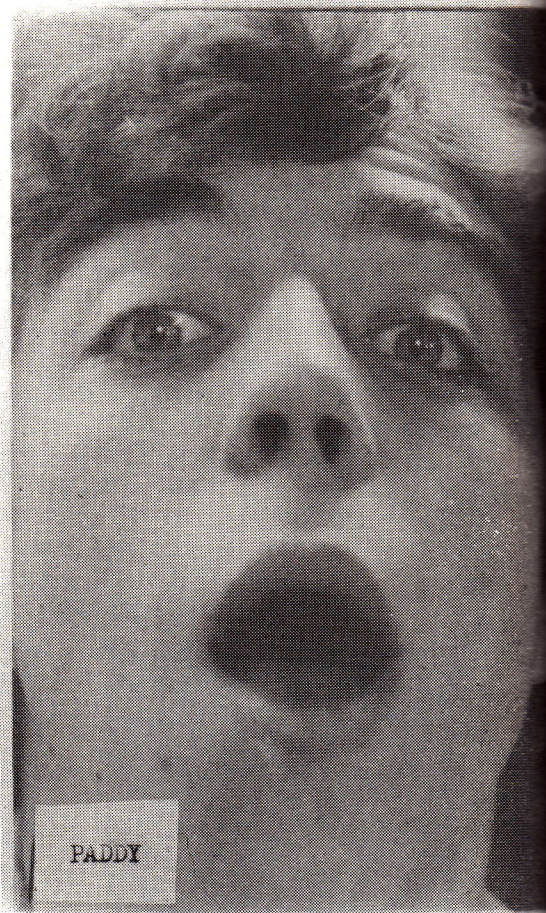

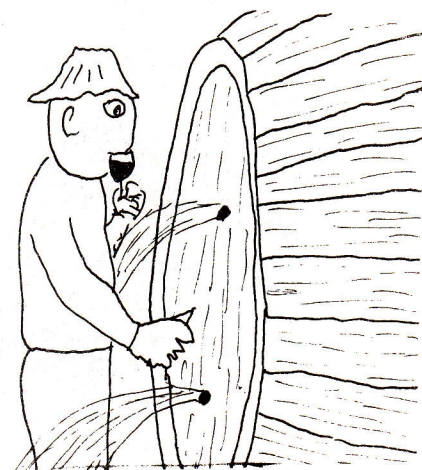

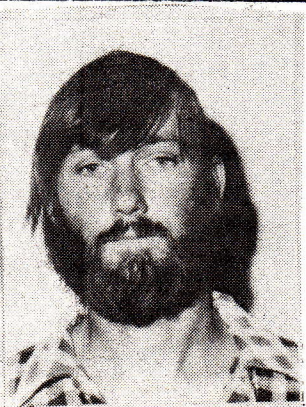
CROCKETT'S COTES DE M.G.:

This wine shows potential, having overcome the disadvantage of being nurtured in a sink. Somewhat groping on the palate with a distinct dry finish. Problems with watering down.

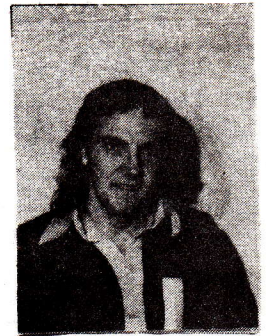

Secker, Mark Alias Sek, Marrett

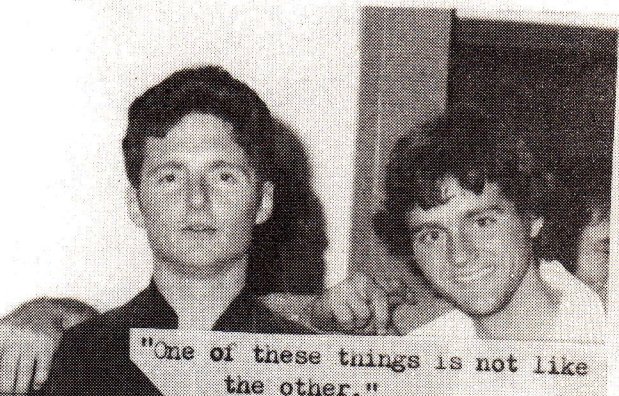
