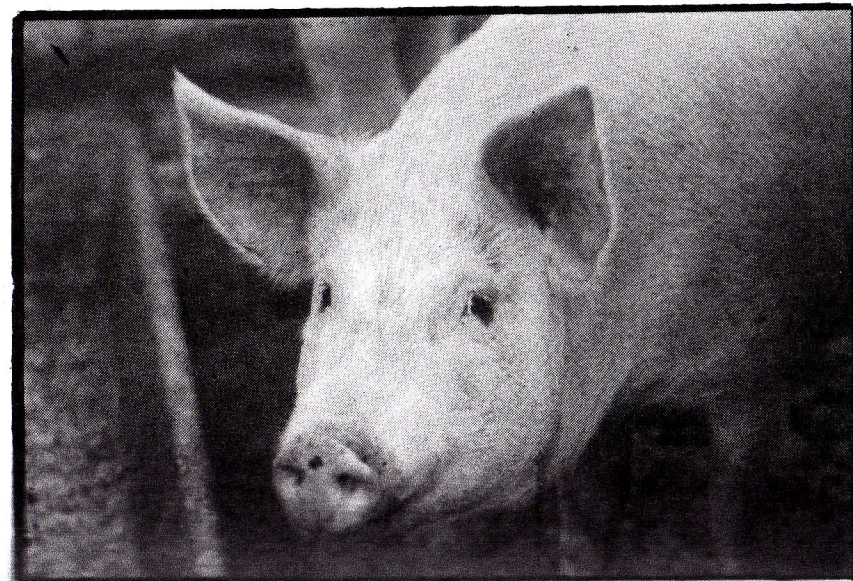
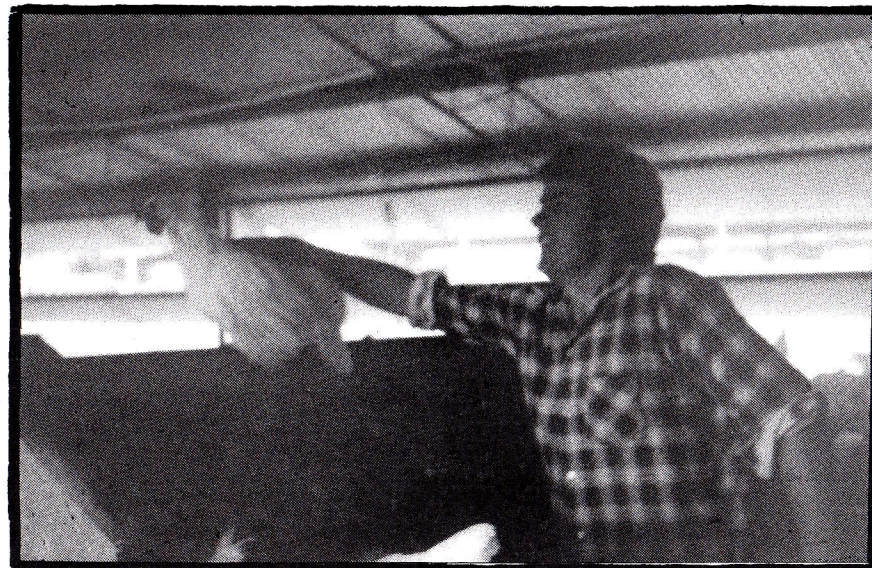
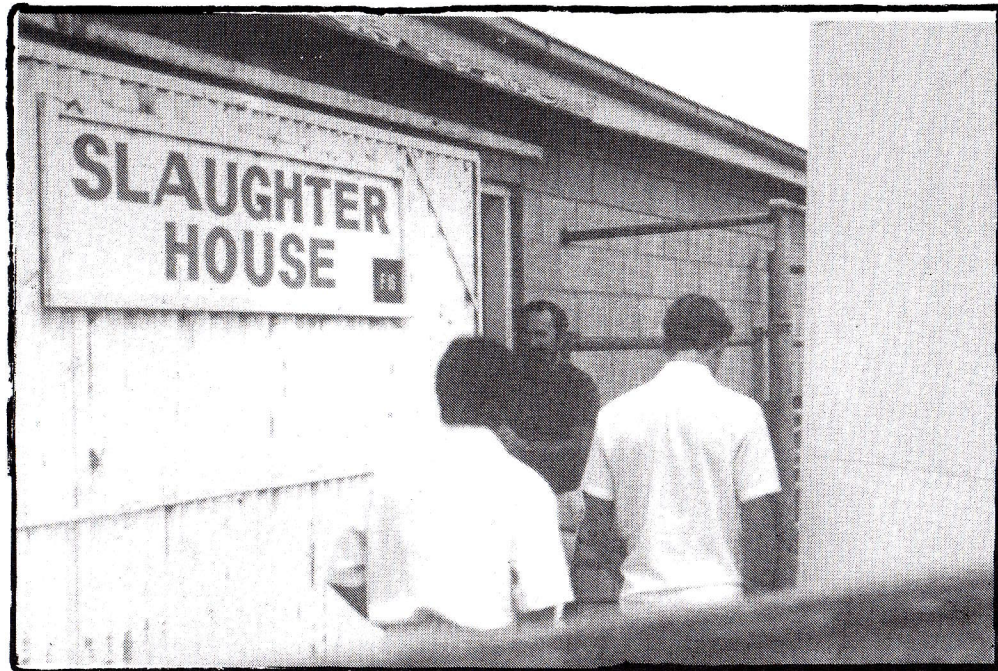

# PRESIDENTS REPORT

Apart from 1984 being the last year of the RDAG course (the Dags), making way for the long awaited Degree course, it was also an eventful year for the student body.

Following elections in 1983, the SUC was again predominantly comprised of Aggies, (but then who can complain), who rolled up in February, champing at the bit and rearing to get on with the job of leading the student body for another year. (Notice the horse-person lingo!)

The first major activity was Orientation, which was expertly organised and run by P.D. and the 1984 Orientation Committee. Participation by students in these activities was improved compared to previous years and a great time was had by all. Despite threats of the powers from above, abolishing Student Orientation, it now looks like Orientation will go ahead as usual in 1985.

A fair number of shows were organised during the year, which were in general well attended by students. Non-SUC shows which were organised during the year and deserve a mention include the Antelope Eve Ball, (thanks to Hoppy & Co.) Droopers and the Lunchcutters Ball which uncovered some surprising new local talent, (as well as several cut lunches). The Revue was once again a huge success and congratulations are extended to Noel Richardson and the group of students and staff involved in putting on the event for their efforts. A first for the SUC this year was the involvement of RAC in the first Joint Campus concert with Adelaide, Flinders and Magill campuses. The concert featured 'Icehouse' and provided some much needed funds to the SUC.

Open Day this year was very successful and for the first time actually made money, thanks to the organisation of P.D. and the effort of those students and staff contributing on the day.

Early in 1984, the pressure of previous years deficits led to the SUC drawing up a concise budget and cashflow for 1984, and by carefully managing our spending the Union is now in a financially better position than other years. Plans have been made to, as soon as possible, relocate the SUC shoppe and set up a coffee lounge in the Community Club building as well as to upgrade sporting facilities on College.

Other developments within the Union during the year included the compiling, and later acceptance by the student body, a new SUC Constitution which when finally accepted by Council, will make things we have done in the past legal as

well as giving scope for development in the future. Also a car has been leased by the SUC for use by the SUC executive officer, the SUC and it's affiliated clubs, as well as for hire to the Community Club and College.

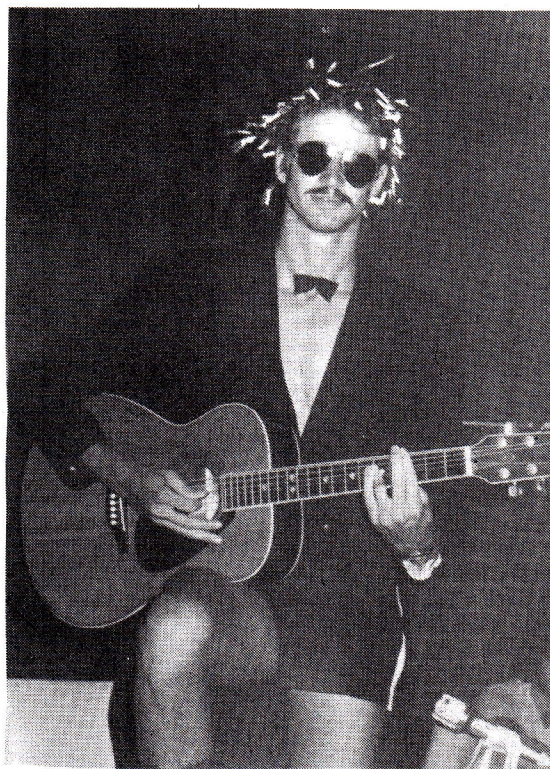

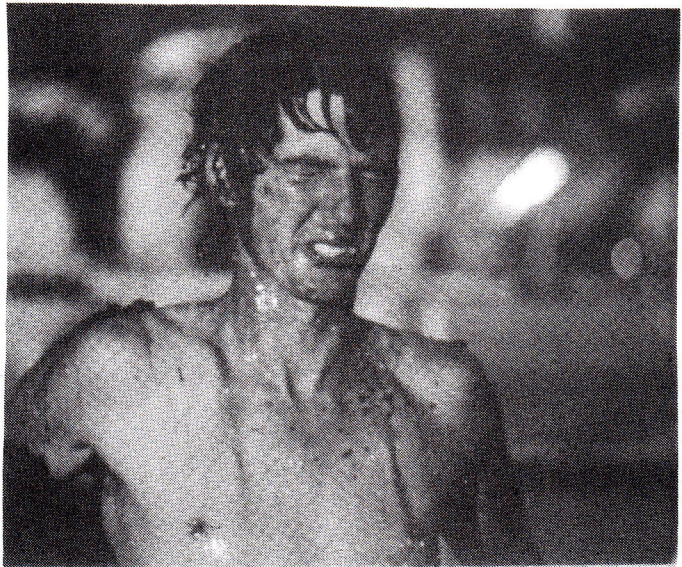

# 1984 GRADUATION

The damp weather did not dampen spirits on Graduation day as scores of jubilant grads came forward to accept their parchments from President of Council Dr. Bruce Eastick. The record number of graduates was reflected in the huge crowd of well wishers who packed the large marquee to bursting point.

The day started with a commemorative service held in the College Chapel and the Gawler ministers fraternal rallied to provide a memorable ecumenical event for graduates and their families.

The Residential Services Staff entertained special guests with a truly fine luncheon as last minute preparations for the Graduation Ceremony were made. It was to be a long day for Residential Services who excelled with catering for the luncheon, the huge afternoon tea, student meals and the Graduation Dinner! Congratulations to them.

The Graduation Ceremony was a smoothly organised event and full credit must go to Milton Spurling and the Academic Secretariat for their faultless attention to detail.

The speechmasters of the day were brief and entertaining with a welcome from Bruce Eastick, a summary of the College's activities in 1983 from the Director, the occasional address from the Premier and a vote of thanks from Phil May. The Director left no-one in doubt that RAC was moving forward at a cracking pace. He announced that the Batchelor of Applied Science in Oenology course has been reaccredited and that we have been advised informally that the new Batchelor of Applied Science in Agriculture course has been accepted by the accrediting Committee. He made mention of Roseworthy's expansion of external teaching, especially through the Farm Secretarial Studies Course.

Our population explosion came in for mention and he appealed to the Commonwealth Government to consider Roseworthy's special need for student accomodation. The addition of only one substantial building for teaching during the last ten years, while the number of courses and students has quadrupled, is placing growth at Roseworthy in jeopardy. The constuction of the Agriculture Building, which has been the top priority for the building programme in S.A. for the last three years is vital and must not continue to be displaced by interstate projects.

The Director paid tribute to our Plant Breeding Team for the work leading to the release of the new wheat varieties Spear Bayonet and Dagger.

GRADUATION DAY CONT.....

Mr. Bannon affirmed Roseworthy's significant place in the development of the State and encouraged the College to more aggressively pursue educational programmes which will give South Australia the ability to research and respond accurately to overseas markets for agricultural products.

In thanking the Premier and his wife for participating in the ceremony Phil May, last year's Student Union President, paid tribute to his SUC and to the Student body for their support for the College in 1983.

The boys did it again for the 6th coming of Droopers. A record 650 people crammed their faces, bladders, livers and Freeling Oval Pavillion.

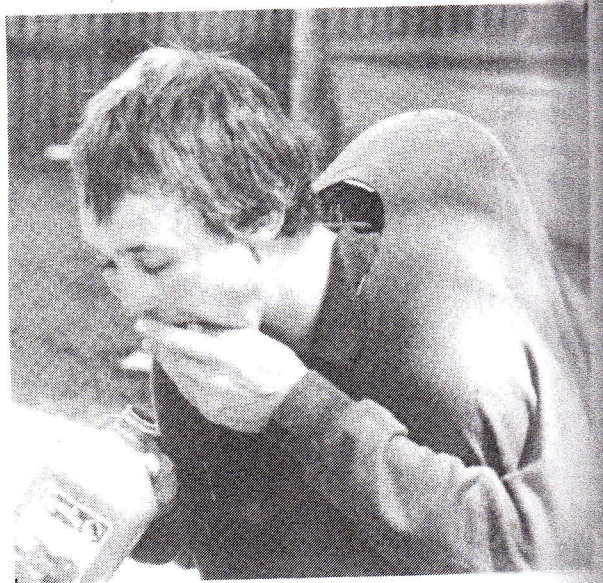

I wish next years committee all the best under the guidance of Wayne Donaldson, Dave Smith and Steve Peake.

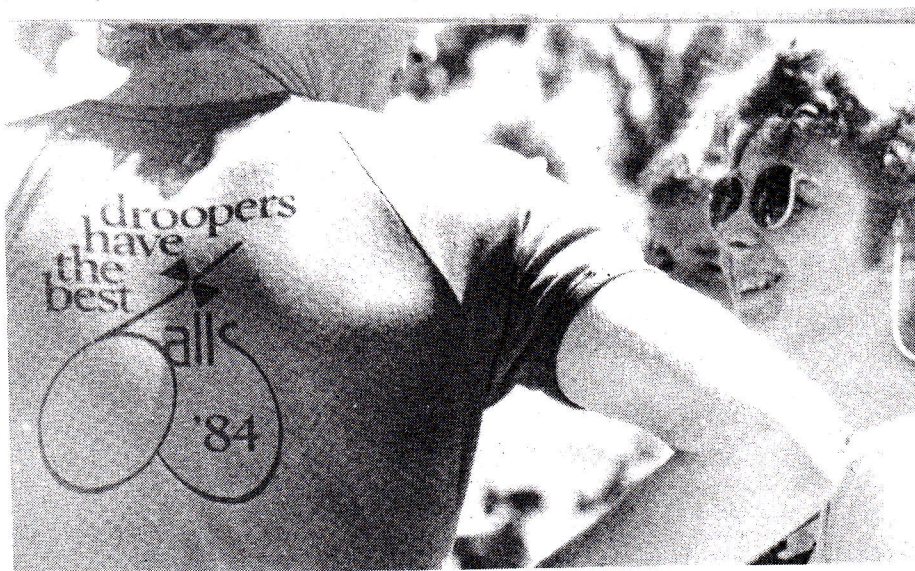
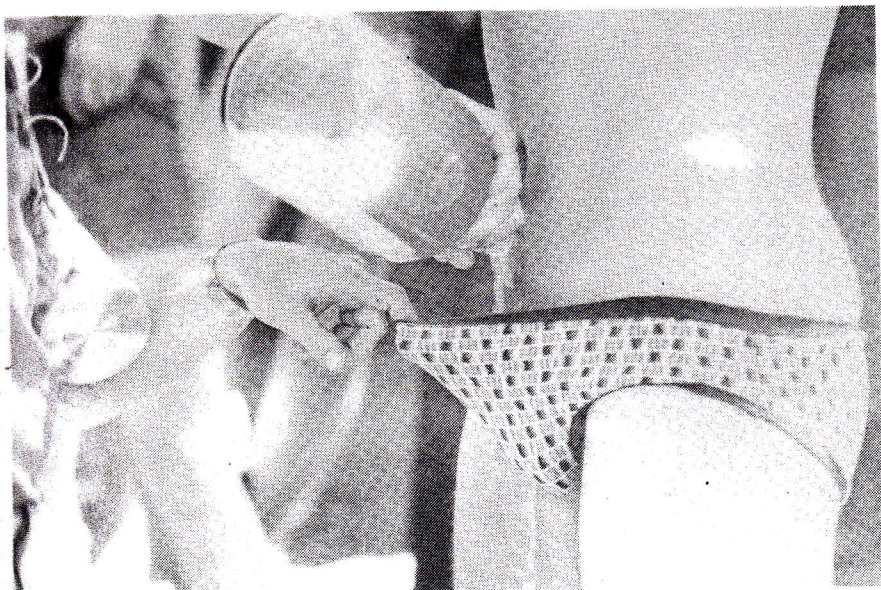

# OUTDOOR CLUB

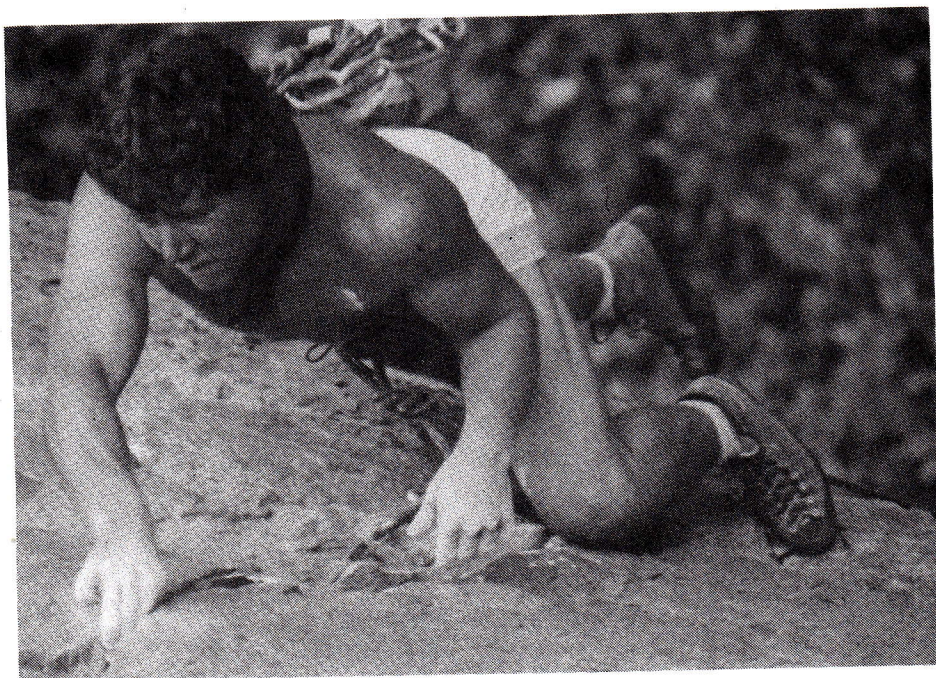

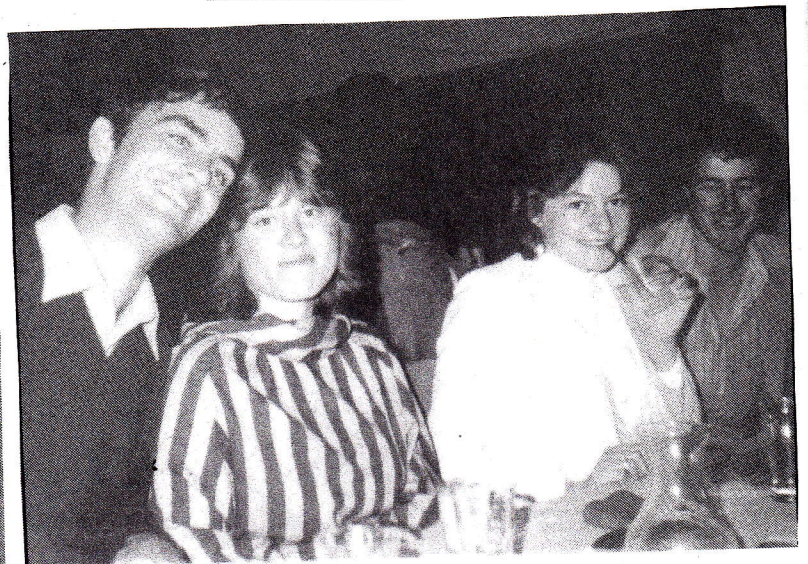
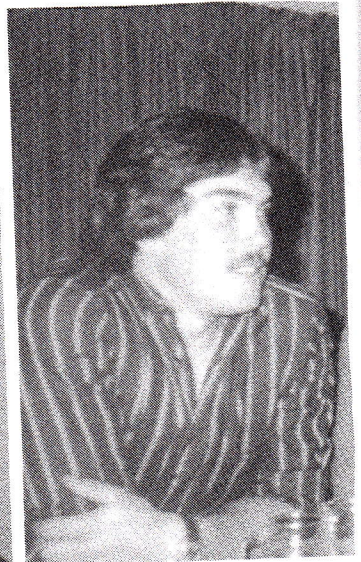
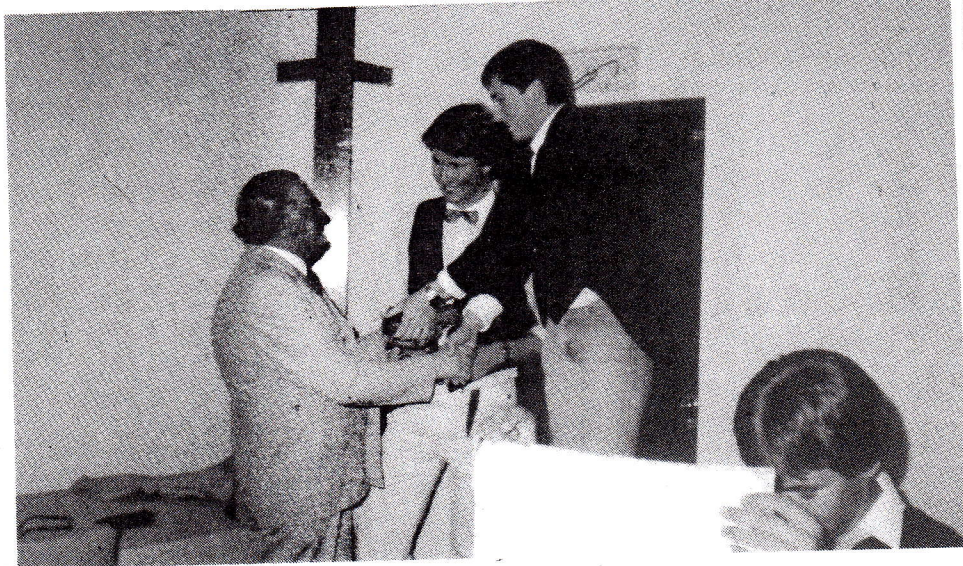
# "BAG OF DAGS" HALF WAY SHOW

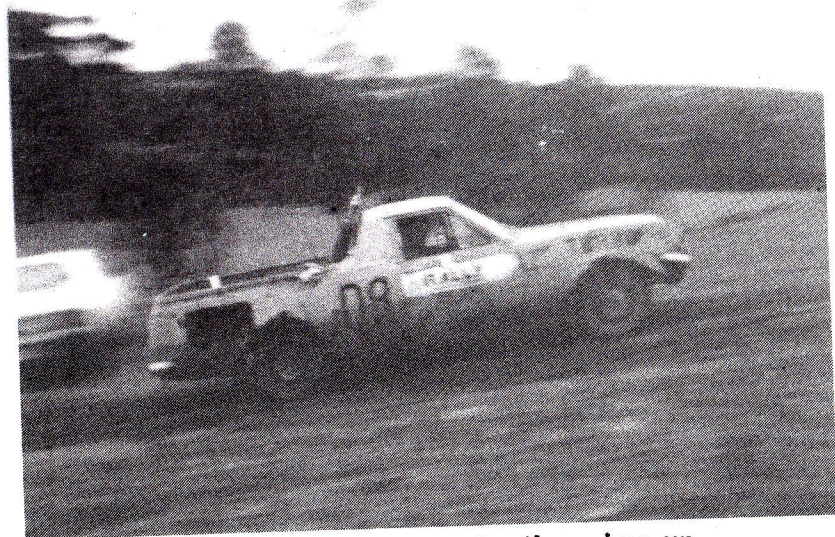

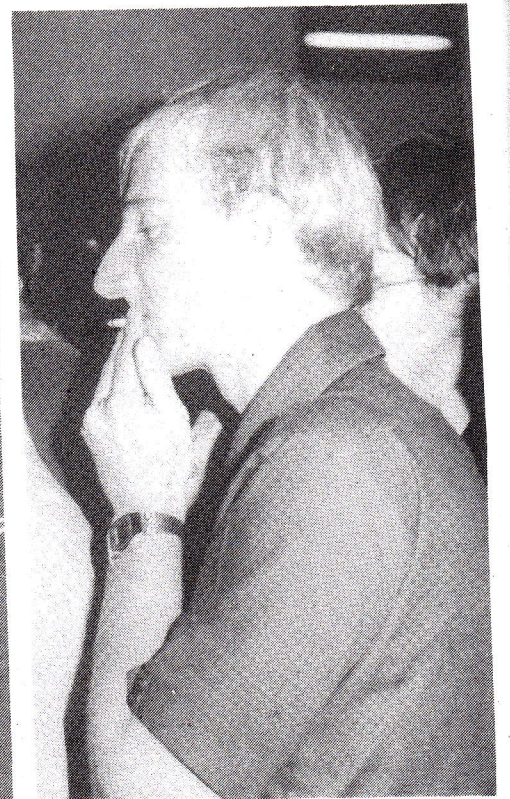
In conclusion I would like to state that this or other immature and selfish acts will not be repeated again in the future.

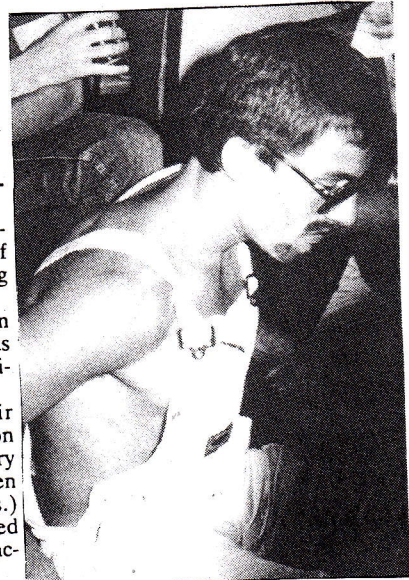
A detailed catalogue of wrongdoing includes allegations that:


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I have spoken with Chris Osborne, Scott Keach, Greg Limjoon, Anna Roberts and Michael Cope-Williams in sufficient detail to be convinced that three of those students were involved in a dismaying and disreputable event last Sunday.

The information available to me indicates that at about 5.30 p.m. last Sunday, after leaving Salisbury Campus of SACAE in the SUC vehicle, Keach, Limjoon and Cope-Williams bared their posteriors to passing motorists and pedestrians. I am extremely disappointed and disillusioned that such behaviour could occur in a vehicle identified so clearly by the logo and its licence plate with Roseworthy Agricultural College.

I am informed that several members of the public took down the licence number of the vehicle, and therefore it may be that you will be contacted by the Police. At this stage, however, this does not seem to have occurred, and neither have I received any approaches from the Police. I hope that the Police do not become involved because of the seriously adverse publicity that I believe this would bring inevitably.

Nonetheless, I consider that the matter is a serious one, and I refer it to the SUC and its Disciplinary Committee for consideration.

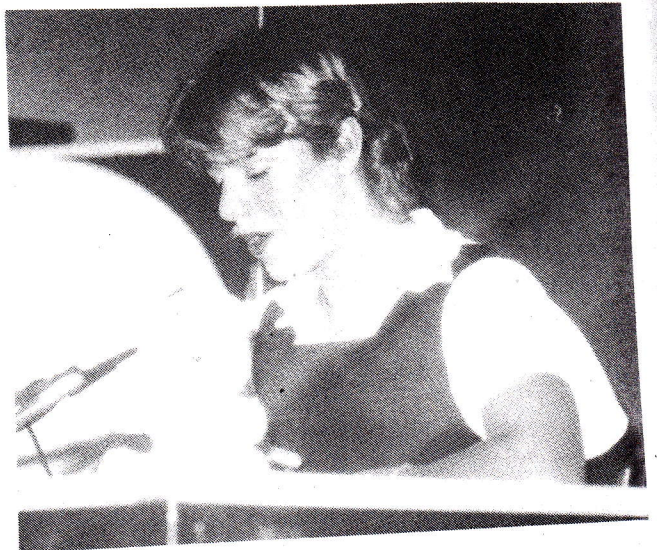
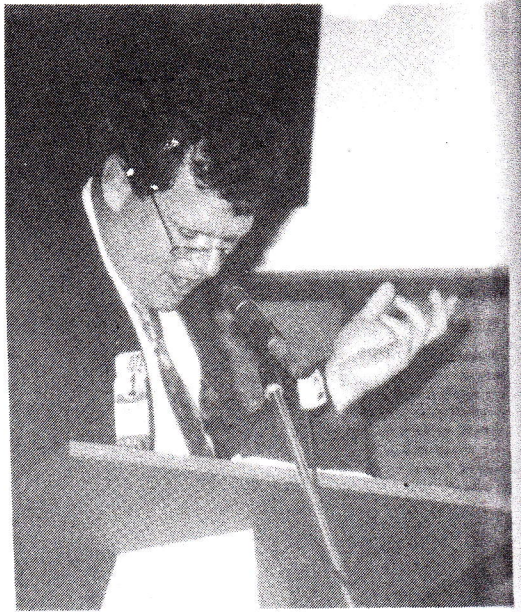
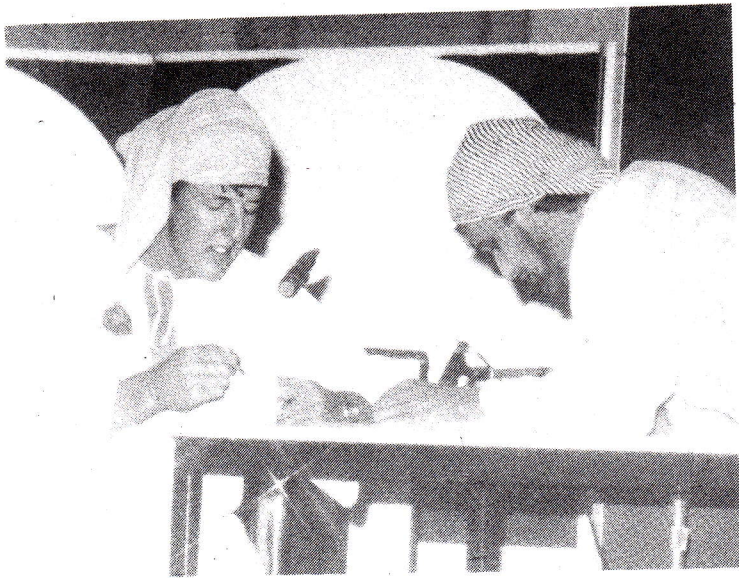
The Disabled were represented in the show by a one-armed violinist (David Brook) who had a little trouble with tone, probably due to humidity and lack of familiarity with the score.

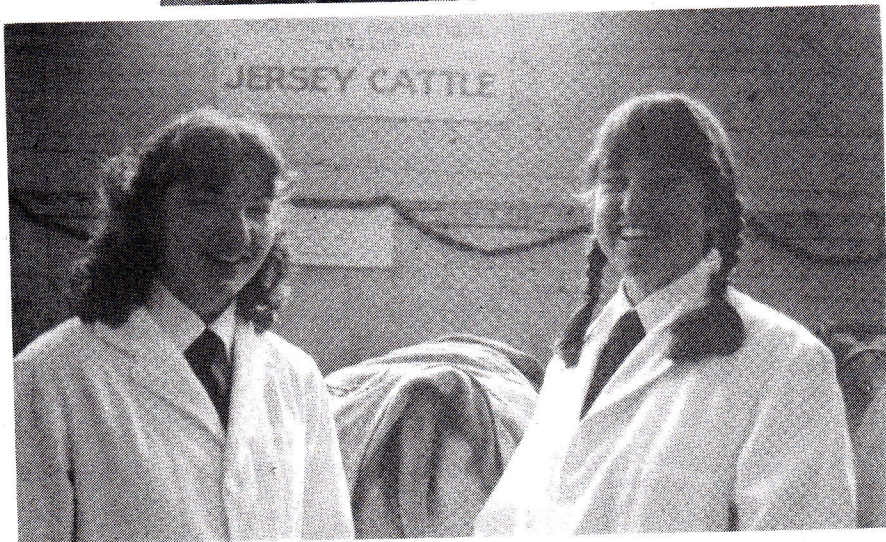
Both teams were entered into the lightning carnival as a pre-season warm up at Stockwell.
