#### **ACT ONE**

The god Dionysus in an effort to save Athens during the dark days of the Peloponnesian war decides to bring back the poet Euripides from Hades, the resting place of the dead. With his slave Xanthias he seeks out Heracles who gives them directions to the underworld.

On their descent they meet Charon the ferryman who takes Dionysus across the Great Lake leaving Xanthias to walk. The croaking chorus of Frogs annoy Dionysus so much he takes to singing like Elvis Presley. Dionysus and Xanthias are reunited and make their way to the Gate Keeper of Hades where they are met by Aeacus in an unusual fashion.

### <u>ACT TWO</u>

After Xanthias unleashes his libido on a slave girl and comes off third best a contest ensues between the two great dead poets: Aeschylus and Euripides.

Aeschylus representing the old school, wishes to retain the Chair of Tragedy next to Pluto: a great honour - but Euripides, a wet behind the ears, iconoclastic modernist is keen to plant himself firmly in the same place. The Battle of The Bards ensues with Dionysus as referee. The two poets thrust and parry, weave and bob, in a war of words from which there can be only one victor. Who shall rise from the ashes? Watch and See.
