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REC. 25.10.24 A NATIONAL UNIVERSITY.

ESTABLISHMENT AT CANBERRA HIGH STANDARD SUGGESTED.

Melbourne, October 26. A suggestion that the Commonwealth Parliament should be given power to establish a national university for technical and research was made by Professor T. H. Laby, Professor of Physics and Natural Philosophy at the University of Melbourne, at the enquiry by the Royal Commission on the Commonwealth Constitution to-day.

His view is that a national university should be established at Canberra, to be for Australia what the University of Cambridge is for Great Britain, and what Yale and Harvard are for the United States. It should be something greater than a mere research and residential university, and a high standard of education should be demanded of students on entrance.
