BOTANICAL PROBLEMS.

Dr. Hill in Adelaide.

Warning Against Over-Grazing.

Dr. A. W. Hill (Director of the famous Kew Royal Botanic Gardens, England) arrived in Adelaide on Monday afternoon after an interesting trip by rail from Western Australia.

In company with Professor T. G. B. Osborn, Dr. Hill went across country to inspect the Koonamore Flora Reserve, and down to Anlaby, Kapunda, where he was the guest of Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Dutton on Sunday.

In an interview at the Adelaide Club on Monday, Dr. Hill, explaining his mission, remarked that, thanks to the Empire Marketing Board, and the Council of Scientific and Industrial Research, the Kew institution authorities had allowed him to travel. Of course, this would be of enormous benefit. One of his chief objects was to get into personal touch with botanical workers in different parts of the Empire, and discuss with them their problems. Kew was the headquarters of botanical work throughout the Empire, and one of the directors' duties included that of Botanical Adviser to the Secretary of State for the Dominions in connection with matters concerning problems overseas. He also saw all the young men who were coming out to take up scientific posts in the dominions, and naturally the more one was in personal touch with those problems, and the people working them out, the more assistance one should be able to give to the Imperial Government.

First Australian Observations.

Dr. Hill said that the Council of Scientific Research were arranging his itinerary in Australia, and already he had seen much to interest him. His visit to Koonamore with Professor Osborn had been a valuable experience, and he would like to see similar research applied to our grass lands. "One thing that impressed me enormously, especially in South Australia," the doctor added, "is to see the terrible business that is taking place in the over-grazing of your sheep country, and what on earth is going to be the future! No doubt this is a bad season, but you are confronted by the difficulty of the blue-bush and saltbush for instance, not sprouting again if it is over-grazed. What will happen then? So long as there is plenty of open country at the back you can say 'move back,' but you might have a howling wilderness in your wake. Unless rainfall comes, or you strike some unknown water supply, heaven help it, so far as I can see as a casual visitor. Anything that will tend to show how land can be saved by preventing over-grazing will be most invaluable. It is extraordinarily interesting to the botanist, and of great importance to the industry. I have had a great opportunity to traverse much of your country already. One thing that has struck me forcibly in Australia is the astonishing result of man's industry in cultivation within the comparatively brief period of settlement. What surprises me as a botanist is the cutting down of trees and the destruction of native flora. Luckily you have places here where these are being preserved, and you are fortunate to have a gentleman like Mr. J. M. Black to help work out South Australian flora."

Early Links with Australia.

Dr. Hill went on to refer to the botanical activities of the past, so far as Australia is concerned. At Kew and the British Museum, he said, they had collections of the early types of Australian plants. There had been so much historic connection between Kew and Australia, because Sir Joseph Banks had been Botanical Adviser to King George III. Until the death of His Majesty in 1820 Sir Joseph had been looking after Kew, and directing colonial enterprise, which had been carried on ever since. The present development, which had been brought about by the Empire Marketing Board, was really nothing more than a reversion to some of the things that Sir Joseph Banks had started. He (Dr. Hill) had induced the Empire Marketing Board to restore the sending out of botanical collections to the tropics and other parts of the world, and at the present moment two of his assistants were visiting the Federated Malay States and Java to study economic problems there. That was reverting to the policy existent in the days of Sir Joseph Banks, when collectors came out here to look for plants of interest. Under the early regime of Sir Joseph Hooker, when Kew became a national institution, a few collectors had been sent out, but since then the whole matter had lapsed, and they had had to rely upon the enterprise of private firms and people. Now, however, one had power to dispatch scientific travellers to any part of the world where it may seem worth while to do it.

Distinguished Visitor's Engagements.

To-day Dr. Hill will be entertained at luncheon by the Chairman (Dr. E. Angus Johnson) and members of the Botanical Garden Board at the Garden kiosk. On Wednesday the ad eundem degree of Doctor of Science will be conferred upon him at the Adelaide University Commemoration ceremony. He will remain in Adelaide for a few days, after which he will visit the eastern States, including Tasmania, where he will attend the Science Congress. Dr. Hill will subsequently go to New Zealand, and return to England via Java and Ceylon.
